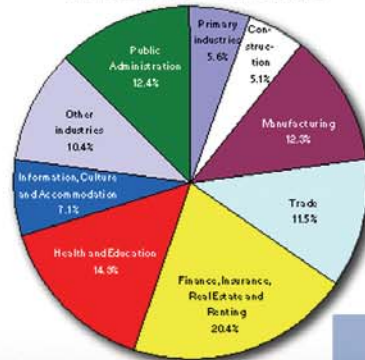

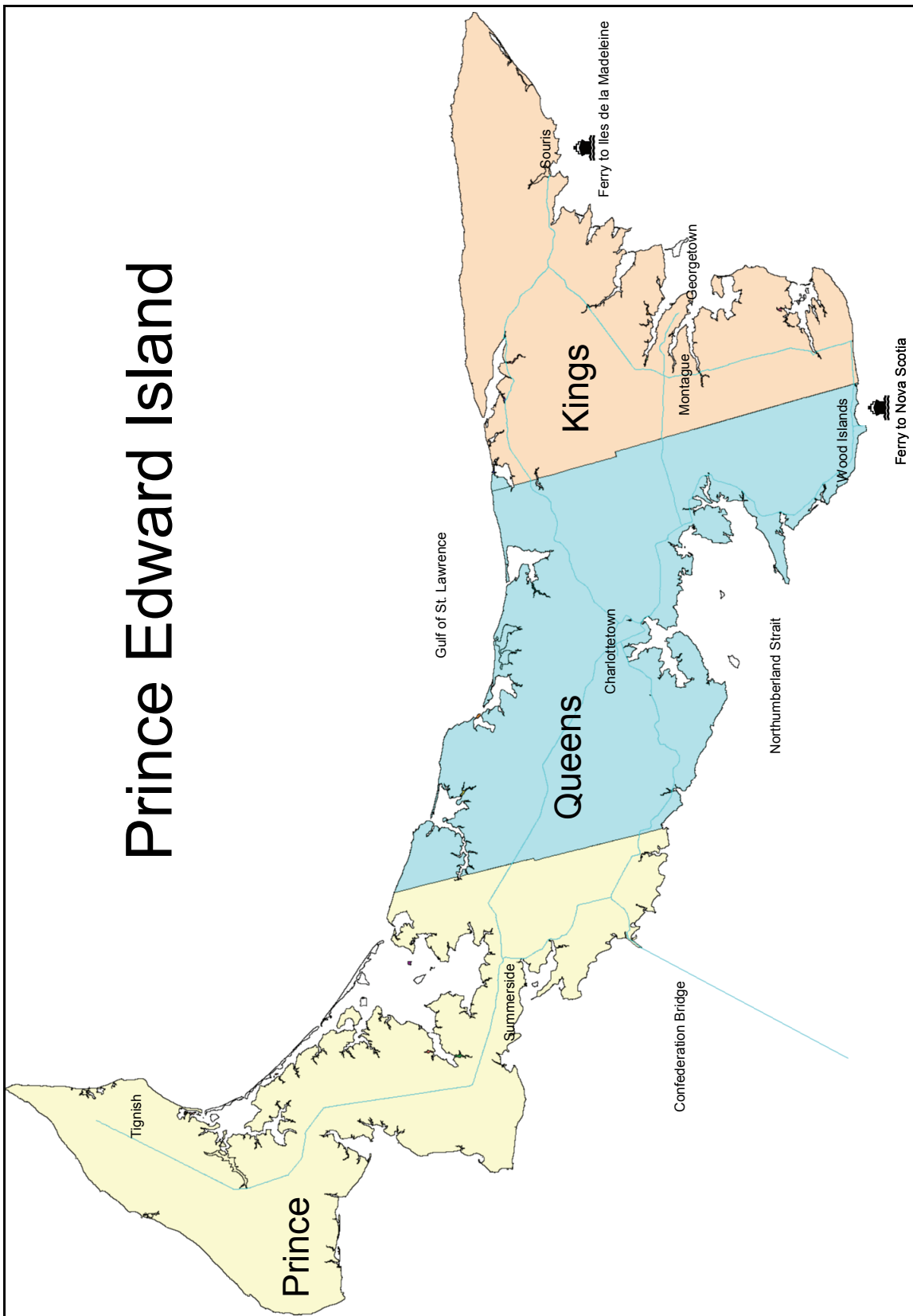

# Prince Edward Island





## *A Historical Note*

Before the European explorations, the island was frequently used by the native Mi'kmaq for fishing, hunting and some planting. The Mi'kmaq called the island *Epekwithk*, meaning "cradle on the waves." Europeans later changed the pronunciation of the name to *Abegweit*. Historians credit the European discovery of the island to Jacques Cartier, the French navigator, who claimed the island for Francis I, King of France, on 1 July 1534. In 1720 the island, then called *Île Saint Jean*, was colonized by 300 French settlers, sponsored by a commercial company of the Comte de Saint Pierre. The island was ceded to Great Britain in 1763. Two years later the designated capital city of the *Island of St. John* took on the name *Charlotte Town* in honour of Queen Charlotte, wife of King George III of England. In 1799 the colony was renamed Prince Edward Island in honour of Edward, Duke of Kent, who was then commander of the British forces in North America. Prince Edward Island is known as the "Cradle of Confederation," because the Charlottetown Conference, held there in 1864, initiated the movement toward Canada's federation. The island became a province in 1873.

The Armorial Bearings<sup>(1)</sup> of the Province of Prince Edward Island, shown above, were proclaimed to come into force on 13 December 2002. The centrepiece is the Shield of Arms, granted by King Edward VII in 1905, featuring the English heraldic lion, a large oak tree on the right and three young saplings on the left. The mature tree originally represented England, while the three saplings stand for the three counties – Kings, Queens and Prince. Scrolled along the bottom of the Shield of Arms are the Latin words *Parva Sub Ingenti*, which, when translated, read: *The small under the protection of the great*. The surrounding elements of the Armorial Bearings illustrate significant characteristics of the province, its position in the Canadian federation, its founding peoples and its natural resources.

### Provincial Flag

The design of the Prince Edward Island flag is modelled after the Coat of Arms flag in rectangular shape and is bordered on the three sides away from the mast by alternate bands of red and white.



### Provincial Flower

The Lady's Slipper was adopted as the provincial flower on April 25, 1947. The orchid gets its name from the shape of its petals, which form a pouch somewhat like a slipper.



### Provincial Tree

The Red Oak was adopted as the provincial tree in 1987. At one time the Red Oak was widely distributed in the hardwood areas of the province. It was used in shipbuilding and making barrels for dry goods.



### Provincial Bird

During the 1977 session of the PEI Legislative Assembly, the Blue Jay was officially named the provincial bird. It was chosen after a province-wide public vote held during Environment Week in 1976. Winter is the ideal time for sighting the Blue Jay, its shrill cries cutting the silence of the crisp winter air.

# Economic Review 2004

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## Overview

While the national economy experienced an improved level of growth in 2004, the Island economy slowed down somewhat. Statistics Canada estimates that the Canadian economy expanded by 2.8 per cent in constant dollars following 2.0 per cent growth in 2003. The Prince Edward Island economy grew by 1.7 per cent in 2004, slightly down from 1.9 per cent growth a year earlier. Economic performance in 2004 was accompanied by positive employment growth, gains in labour income and strong residential construction activity. Weak retail sales, a decline in export activity and lower tourist numbers were moderating factors. The value of Prince Edward Island's Gross Domestic Product (GDP) at market prices for 2004 is estimated to be \$4,000 million.

Statistics Canada's estimates of GDP by industry indicate that in 2004 the leading growth sectors in the province were: *health care and social assistance* (up by 5.9 per cent), *finance, insurance and real estate services* (up by 3.8 per cent), *wholesale trade* (up by 2.1 per cent) and *manufacturing* (up by 1.9 per cent).

The general rise in the *All-Items Consumer Price Index* (CPI) for Prince Edward Island was 2.1 per cent in 2004. Leading factors contributing to this rise were higher prices for *energy* (up by 8.7 per cent) and *tobacco and alcohol* (up by 8.2 per cent). In Canada prices increased by 1.9 per cent in 2004.

Employment on Prince Edward Island expanded by 0.9 per cent in 2004 to average 66,700 per month, an all-time high, while total labour income increased by 4.8 per cent. The unemployment rate averaged 11.3 per cent in 2004, up from 11.0 per cent in 2003.

Manufacturing shipments on Prince Edward Island reached an all-time high of \$1,414.3 million in 2004, an increase of 4.3 per cent. This compares to 2.2 per cent growth in 2003. According to Statistics Canada, the value of P.E.I.'s exports of goods increased slightly: from \$640.5 million in 2003 to \$643.9 million in 2004, an increase of 0.5 per cent.

The economic performance of Prince Edward Island is discussed in more detail following a brief analysis of the national economy in 2004.

# The Canadian Economy

The Canadian economy performed well in 2004, benefiting from strong growth in final domestic demand and a rebound in exports. Annual growth of 2.8 per cent in real GDP for 2004 compares to last year's rate of 2.0 per cent. This strength was in spite of soaring oil prices and a stronger Canadian dollar, whose continued appreciation was a drag on exports.



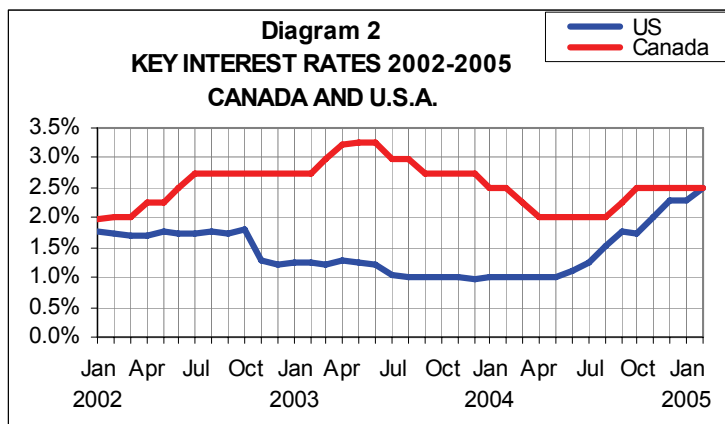

Diagram 1 shows quarterly real GDP growth between 2002 and 2004. After a decline in the second quarter of 2003, economic growth improved during the first half of 2004. However, the expansion slowed during the last half of that year with lower exports offsetting steady gains in domestic demand.

The overall expansion in 2004 (measured in chained 1997 dollars) was led by *consumer spending* (up by 3.4 per cent), followed by *business gross fixed capital formation* (up by 6.2 per cent) and *government expenditures* (up by 2.5 per cent). The role of net international trade diminished further in 2004 with *total exports* down by 4.9 per cent and *imports* up by 8.2 per cent.

The U.S. economy showed strong economic growth of 4.4 per cent in 2004. This compares favourably to 3.0 per cent growth in 2003 and 1.9 per cent in 2002. Its economic performance was highlighted by strong domestic demand, especially consumer spending and federal government expenditures, and export growth. However, employment increased by 0.9 per cent in 2004, after a decline of 0.3 per cent in 2003. The unemployment rate fell to 5.5 per cent in 2004 from 6.0 per cent a year earlier

Both Canada and the United States have become less accommodative in terms of their monetary policies in the latter half of 2004, raising interest rates slightly. However, rates remain low by historical standards. Diagram 2 (see next page) shows monthly movements in the key policy interest rates. In 2004 the *Bank of Canada* raised its target for the overnight lending rate twice since July: from 2.0 per cent to 2.25 per cent in September and to 2.5 per cent in October, where it currently stands.

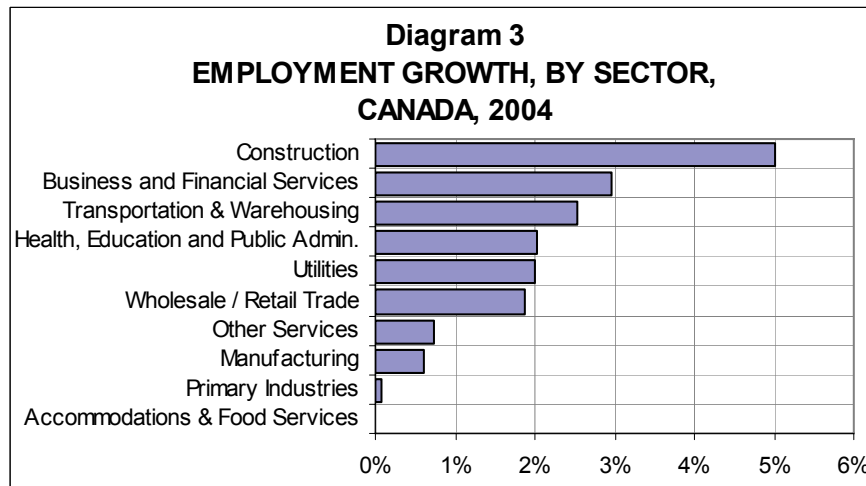

In contrast to Canada, the *U.S. Federal Reserve Bank* raised its target lending rate by 25 basis points in each of its last six rate announcements. The first rate increase came in June 2004, when the rate was increased to 1.25 per cent. The last rate increase, to 2.5 per cent, was announced in February 2005.

Measured in current dollars, total personal expenditures on goods and services rose from \$688.7 billion in 2003 to \$722.6 billion in 2004, an increase of 4.9 per cent. Current dollar spending on durable goods rose by 0.8 per cent, while semi-durable goods increased by 5.0 per cent in 2004. Non-durables and services increased by 5.5 and 5.7 per cent, respectively.

The average Canadian inflation rate, as measured by the *All-Items Consumer Price Index*, fell from 2.8 per cent in 2003 to 1.9 per cent in 2004. The 1.9 per cent increase was largely the result of higher prices for *energy* (up by 6.7 per cent), *alcohol and tobacco products* (up by 5.4 per cent), *housing* (up by 2.6 per cent) and *transportation* (up by 2.4 per cent).

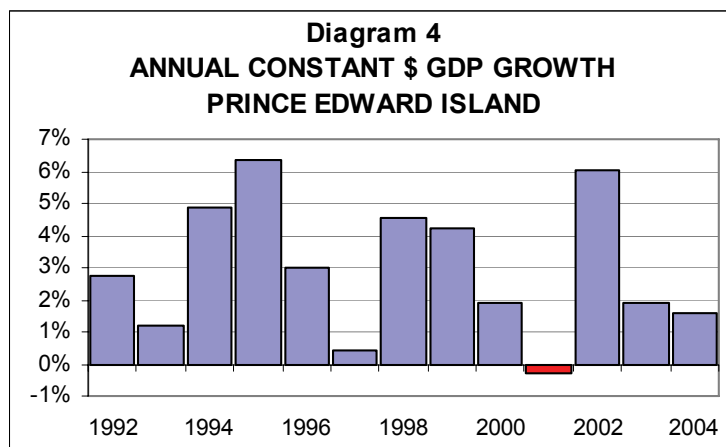
National employment rose from 15.7 million in 2003 to 15.9 million in 2004, an increase of 1.8 per cent, somewhat less than the 2.3 per cent recorded in 2003. The goods-producing sector added 62,100 jobs to the economy, while the service-providing sector expanded by 222,600 jobs.

As shown in Diagram 3, job creation in 2004 occurred across all sectors of the economy with the exception of the *accommodations, food and beverage service sector*, which showed no growth in 2004. The *construction industry* experienced the largest employment growth with an increase of 5 per cent. The national unemployment rate fell slightly, from 7.6 per cent in 2003 to 7.2 per cent in 2004.

# The Prince Edward Island Economy

## Gross Domestic Product

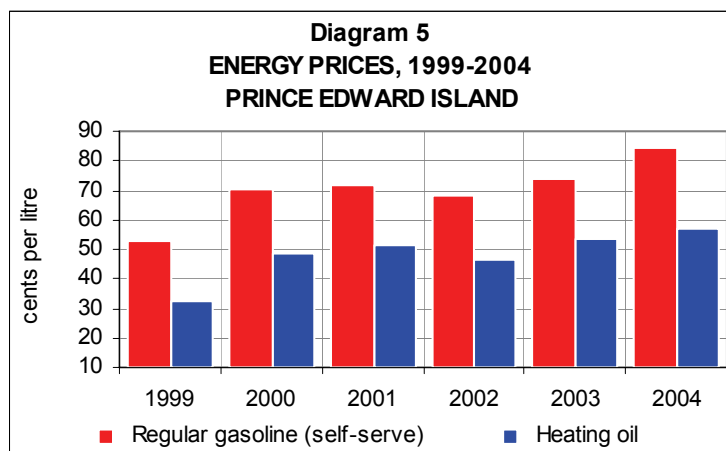
Statistics Canada's preliminary estimates indicate that the Prince Edward Island economy expanded by 1.7 per cent in constant dollars in 2004, after experiencing 1.9 per cent growth in 2003. Diagram 4 shows gains in real provincial GDP since 1992. The value of provincial GDP at market prices for 2004 is estimated by Statistics Canada to be \$4,000 million.

## Consumer Prices

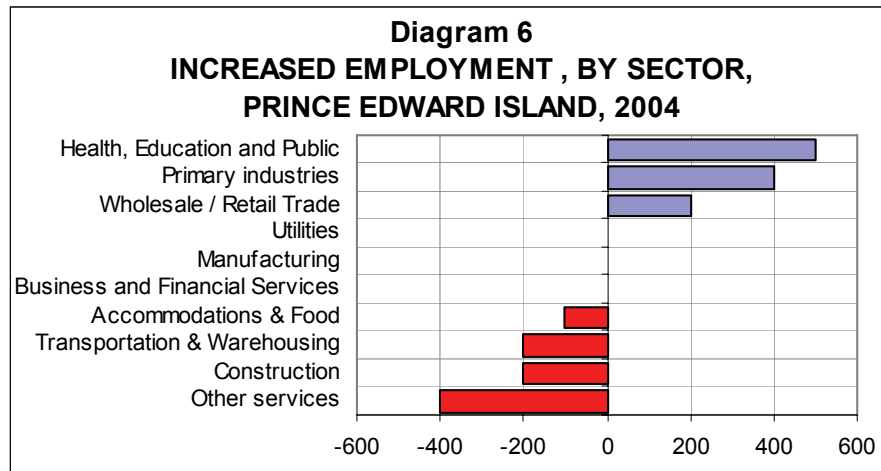
The *All-Items Consumer Price Index* for Prince Edward Island rose by 2.1 per cent in 2004, compared to 1.9 per cent nationally. Energy prices in 2004 were on average 8.7 per cent higher compared to one year ago. Diagram 5 shows that the average price of a litre of unleaded gasoline sold on Prince Edward Island in 1999 was 52.9 cents. In 2004 the price at the pump had risen to 84.1 cents per litre. Heating oil, on average, rose from 32.8 cents per litre in 1999 to 56.8 cents per litre in 2004.

## Labour Force

Employment on Prince Edward Island rose by 0.9 per cent to 66,700 in 2004, establishing a new all-time high. The service-providing sector expanded by 0.4 per cent in 2004, while growth in the goods-producing sector rose by 1.8 per cent. As Diagram 6 indicates, employment gains



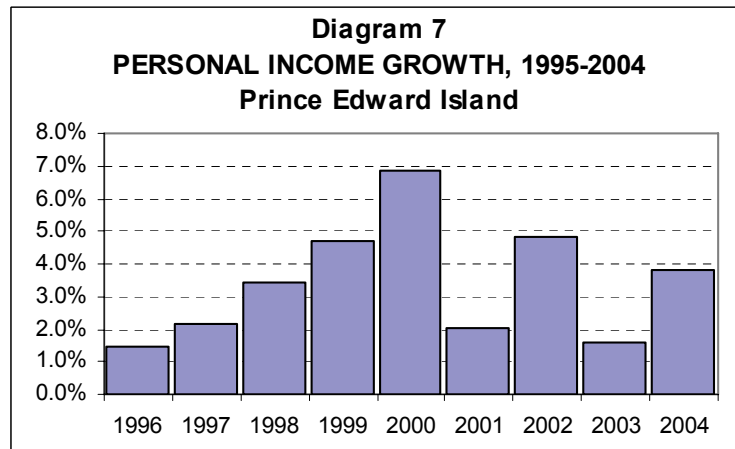

occurred in the *health, education and public administration sector*, the *primary sector*, as well as the *trade sector*. However, these gains were mostly offset by losses in *accommodations and food services, transportation and warehousing, construction, and other services*. The net impact increased employment on Prince Edward Island by 600 jobs in 2004.

The average unemployment rate increased from 11.0 per cent in 2003 to 11.3 per cent in 2004. The labour force participation rate rose slightly from 67.7 per cent in 2003 to 67.8 per cent in 2004

## Income

Statistics Canada estimates that personal income for Prince Edward Island rose from \$3,307 million in 2003 to \$3,434 million in 2004, an increase of 3.8 per cent. Diagram 7 shows personal income growth from 1996 to 2004. The contributors to growth in 2004 were *labour income* (up by \$76 million), *government transfers to persons* (up by \$21 million), *accrued net farm income* (up by \$15 million) and *net unincorporated non-farm business income* (up by \$9 million).

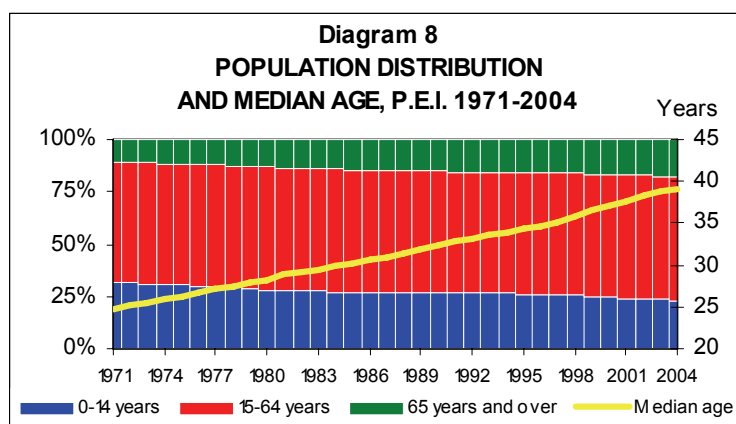
Income derived from *interest, dividends and other investments* increased by 1.6 per cent to reach \$387 million in 2004. Although *federal government transfers to persons* are estimated to be 4.0 per cent higher in 2004, *Employment Insurance (EI) benefits* paid on Prince Edward Island were 1.9 per cent lower than a year earlier at \$193.0 million. The value of regular EI benefits fell by 1.7 per cent from 2003, while fishing benefits increased by 2.9 per cent. Sickness benefits rose by 6.3 per cent in 2004, while maternity benefits fell by 2.0 per cent.

## Population

According to Statistics Canada's estimates, the Island population reached 137,864 on July 1, 2004, an increase of 598 persons or 0.4 per cent from 2003. Natural increase, i.e., total births minus total deaths, contributed 7 per cent to this change, while 43 per cent can be attributed to net international migration and 50 per cent to net inter-provincial migration.

Between July 1, 2003, and June 30, 2004, the majority of Canadians moving to Prince Edward Island came from Ontario (+1,318), Nova Scotia (+540), New Brunswick (+514), Alberta (+384) and Newfoundland and Labrador (+345). During that same period the provinces that attracted the largest numbers of Islanders were Ontario (-1,187), Nova Scotia (-621), Alberta (-445) and New Brunswick (-445).

Diagram 8 shows the Island's population distribution during the period 1971 to 2004. It clearly illustrates the ageing of the population: the proportion of young people (0-14 years) declined from 31.5 per cent in 1971 to 23 per cent in 2004, while the share of elderly persons (65 years and over) rose from 11.0 per cent in 1971 to 17.6 per cent in 2004. The working age group, those between the ages of 15 and 64 years, increased from 57.4 per cent in 1971 to 59.4 per cent in 2004. The diagram further illustrates the increase of the median age<sup>(2)</sup> from 24.8 years in 1971 to 39.1 years in 2004.

# Industrial Profiles

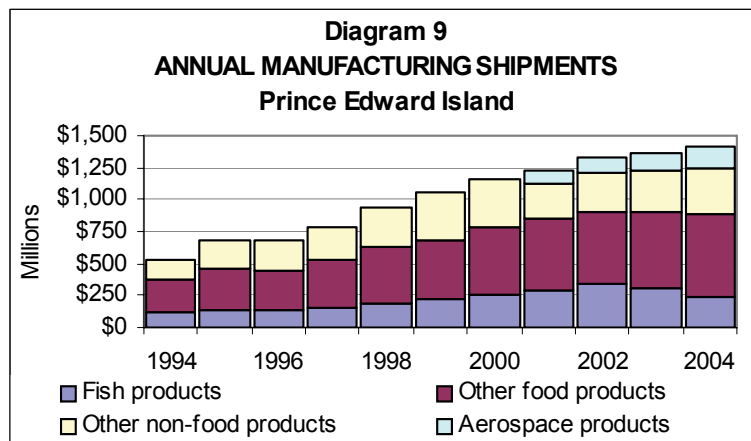
## Manufacturing

The value of Island manufacturing shipments rose from \$1,356.1 million in 2003 to an all-time high of \$1,414.3 million in 2004, an increase of 4.3 per cent. Major growth took place in *food processing* (excluding fish products) and the manufacture of *transportation equipment* (mostly aerospace). *Fish processing* declined considerably in 2004.

The value of *processed food product* shipments, which constituted 62.7 per cent of all shipments in 2004, fell by 1.8 per cent to \$886.8 million. The drop in the value of food shipments in 2004 was mainly the result of a 20.7 per cent decline in the value of *processed fish products*, from \$313.0 million in 2003 to \$248.2 million. The value of *processed potato and other food product* shipments, increased by 8.4 per cent to value \$638.5 million. Non-food manufacturing shipments on Prince Edward Island increased by 16.1 per cent to reach \$527.5 million.

Between 1994 and 2004 total manufacturing shipments increased by 168 per cent to a value of \$1,414.3 million in 2004.

Diagram 9 illustrates that, although food processing remains dominant, non-food manufactures (especially aerospace-related products) have played an increasingly important role in Island manufacturing. During this 10-year period the share of *non-food products* increased from 27.4 per cent of total shipments in 1994 to 37.3 per cent in 2004. The proportion of *aerospace-related products* increased from 7.9 per cent in 2001 to 11.4 per cent in 2004.

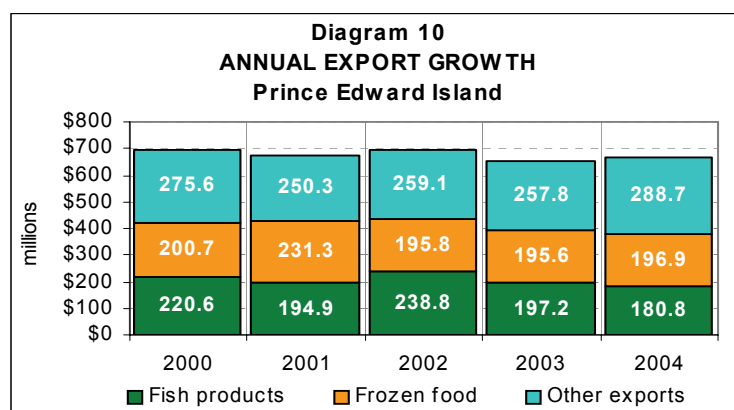

In 2004 the manufacturing sector provided 9.3 per cent of all employment on Prince Edward Island, making it the second largest private sector employer after the retail trade sector. The number of employed persons in the manufacturing sector remained at the 2003 level of 6,200.

## Exports

The total value of exported goods rose from \$650.6 million in 2003 to \$666.4 million in 2004, an increase of 2.4 per cent. Mainly the result of declining values of fish products (see Diagram 10), the lacklustre growth in 2004 was partly caused by a strong Canadian dollar, which kept export values down.

Statistics Canada reported that in 2004 the value of exported food products, which made up 68.3 per cent of total international exports, fell from \$478.4 million in 2003 to \$440.0 million in 2004, a drop of 8.0 per cent. Other exports in 2004 included \$61.5 million in machinery and equipment, \$21.5 million in industrial goods, \$18.1 million in forestry products and \$103.3 million in other Island-made products.

## Agriculture

Total farm cash receipts for Prince Edward Island reached \$348.3 million in 2004, two per cent lower than the value of \$354.5 million recorded in 2003. Table 1 shows the value of farm cash receipts by major commodity from 1998 to 2004. The decline in total receipts in 2004 was mainly the result of declining potato revenues.

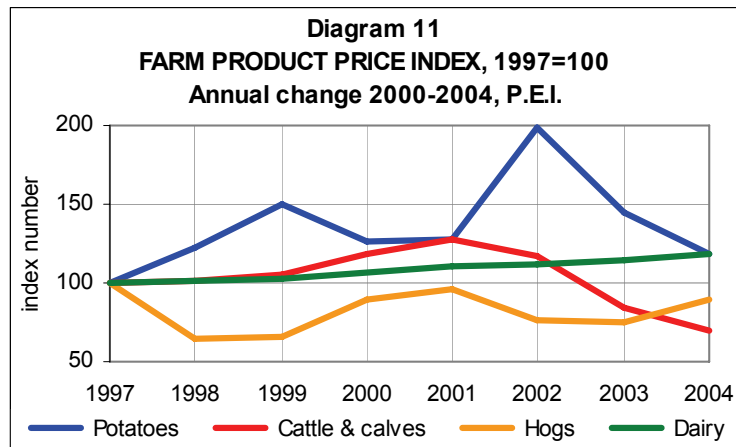

An oversupply of potatoes on North American markets kept prices low, resulting in a 17.8 per cent drop in potato receipts from \$185.3 million in 2003 to \$152.3 million in 2004. Total livestock receipts increased by 8.9 per cent in 2004. An increase of 27.9 per cent in hog receipts was partially offset by a drop of 18 per cent in cattle receipts. Government support payments to farm operators increased by 72.7 per cent from 2003.

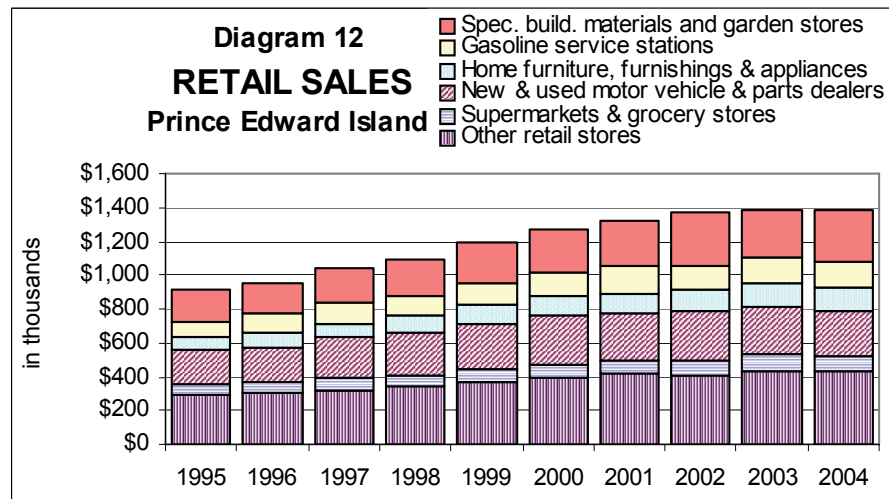
The last two years have been a particularly difficult period for Island farmers. Diagram 11 shows selected Island farm product price indexes from 1997 to 2004. The potato price index fell from an all-time high of 199.9 in 2002 to 118.5 in 2004, a drop of 40.5 per cent. The lingering effects of BSE caused cattle and calves prices to be down for a third consecutive year. On a more positive note, after two years of decline, hog prices recovered to their 2000 price level, while dairy prices increased steadily between 1997 and 2004.

### Retail Trade

Seasonally adjusted retail sales on Prince Edward Island in 2004 were valued at \$1,384.7 million, virtually unchanged from last year. The relatively poor performance in 2003 and 2004 can be partly explained by low new motor vehicle sales. In 2004 there were 4,700 new motor vehicles sold on Prince Edward Island representing a value of \$125.1 million, down 1.9 per cent in value from 2003.



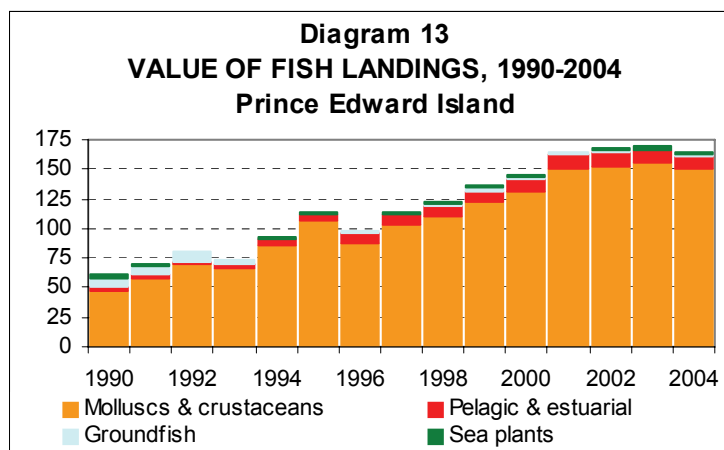

Diagram 12 (see preceding page) shows 10 years of Island retail sales classified by kind of business. The main growth components were: specialized building materials and garden store sales (up by \$119.8 million or 64.9 per cent), furniture, appliances and home furnishing sales (up by \$72.4 million or 98.0 per cent), new and used motor vehicle dealer sales (up by \$61 million or 30.7 per cent), gasoline service station sales (up \$50.2 million or 50.5 per cent), and supermarkets (up by \$26.4 million or 38.5 per cent). Other retail sales increased by \$140.2 million or 48.6 per cent between 1995 and 2004.

The wholesale/retail trade sector continues to be the largest private sector employer in the province at 15.3 per cent. Employment in this sector rose from 8,800 persons in 1995 to 10,200 people in 2004, an increase of 15.9 per cent.

### ***Fisheries and Forestry***

The P.E.I. Department of Agriculture, Fisheries and Aquaculture estimates that the value of total fish landings in 2004 fell by 3.5 per cent to \$163.7 million. Lobsters, mussels and snow crab made up 84 per cent of the value of all fish landings in the province. Diagram 13 shows that the increase in the value of fish landings between 1990 and 2004 can be attributed to molluscs and crustaceans.

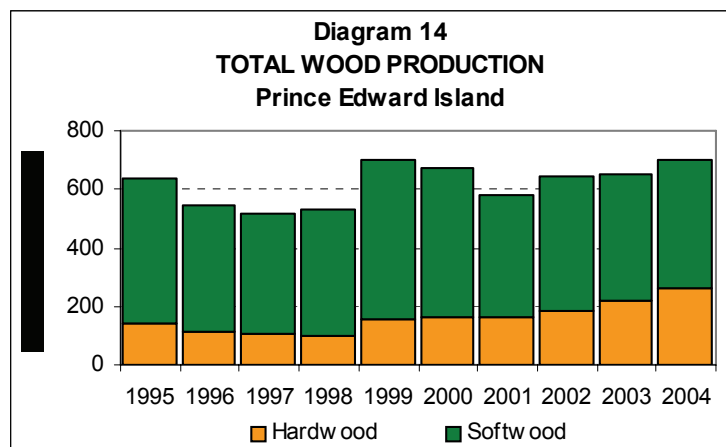

The 2004 lobster catch of 19.9 million pounds was 0.6 per cent lower than a year earlier. Total revenue from lobster landings fell 7.6 per cent in 2004 to just over \$100 million as a result of weak prices. The proceeds from molluscs and crustaceans other than lobster fell by 3.3 per cent. Preliminary data indicate that mussel landings in 2004 were similar to 2003 at about 37 million pounds with an estimated value of \$24.0 million. The value of pelagic and estuarial catches in 2004 was 3.7 per cent higher than in 2003, while groundfish revenues were up by 33.3 per cent compared to a year earlier.

The P.E.I. Department of Environment, Energy and Forestry estimates that the total volume of wood harvested on Prince Edward Island increased from 653,781 cubic metres in 2003 to 703,653 cubic metres in 2004, an increase of 7.6 per cent.

During the last 10 years total wood production increased by an average of 3.7 per cent per year. As Diagram 14 shows, hardwood production has been steadily increasing since 1998, while softwood production has fluctuated during the last 10 years. The volume of primary forest product shipments rose by 6.2 per cent, from 710,367 cubic metres in 2003 to 754,632 cubic metres in 2004. Industrial wood production increased by 4.2 per cent in 2004, while the consumption of fuel wood and fuel chips expanded by 13.3 per cent. According to Statistics Canada, wood industry shipments were valued at \$57.4 million in 2004, up 13.5 per cent from 2003.

### **Tourism**

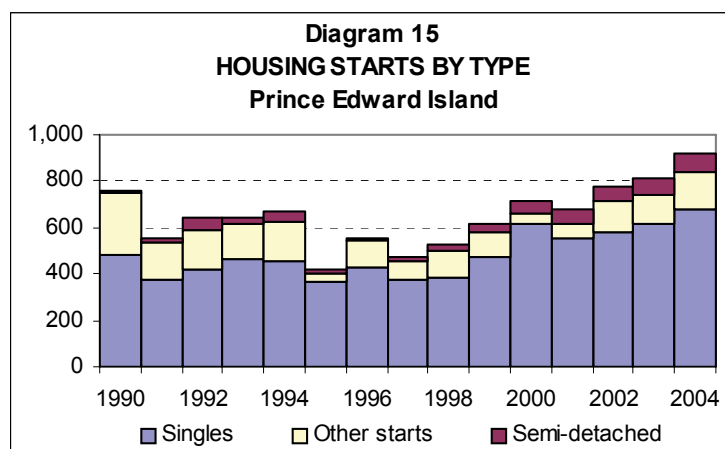
According to the *P.E.I. Department of Tourism*, between May 15 and October 31, 2004, an estimated 350,000 tourist parties took a vacation on Prince Edward Island. This is 11.1 per cent below the total visitor numbers for 2003. Visitation that year was 4.8 per cent below the 2002 level.

Between January and October 2004, total rounds of golf played at the provincial golf courses were down by 14.1 per cent compared to the same period in 2003, while visits to provincial parks and campsite rentals declined by 10.9 per cent in 2004. The number of parties counselled at visitor information centres was 12.3 per cent lower relative to 2003, while visits to historic sites were down by 15.9 per cent between May and October. The tourist industry in 2004 did benefit from increased tourist traffic from cruise ships. There were a total of 28 cruise ship visits to Prince Edward Island compared to 19 visits in 2003.

### **Construction and Investment**

The province experienced another robust year for residential construction. *Canada Mortgage and Housing Corporation* (CMHC) estimates that there were 919 new housing starts on Prince Edward Island in 2004, an increase of 12.9 per cent from 2003. This was the highest level of starts since 1988.

As illustrated by Diagram 15, residential construction has been trending upwards since 1997. Total housing starts expanded at an average annual growth of 5.1 per cent during this period. According to Statistics Canada, the value of Island residential construction in 2004 was 21.9 per cent higher than a year ago and stood at \$267 million.

The pace of new housing construction in 2004 offset a relatively weak year for non-residential construction activity. Statistics Canada estimates the value of total non-residential capital expenditures in 2004 to be \$450.9 million, down 5.7 per cent from 2003. The value of the construction component fell by 16.0 per cent, while the value of investment in machinery and equipment increased by 1.1 per cent.

Statistics Canada estimates that total investment on P.E.I. was \$771.4 million in 2004, an increase of 10.5 per cent over the previous year. Public sector investment fell from \$156.7 million in 2003 to \$97.4 million in 2004, a decline of 37.8 per cent, while private sector investment rose by 15.5 per cent, from \$520.2 million in 2003 to \$601.0 million in 2004.

### Transportation

Prince Edward Island can be reached by land, water and air. According to *P.E.I. Department of Transportation and Public Works* estimates, about 1.5 million vehicles crossed the privately owned Confederation Bridge in both directions in 2004, at par with traffic data in 2003. Bridge traffic during the months of January and February 2004 was up by 0.6 per cent from 2003, while crossings during July and August 2004 were down slightly from the same period last year.

The *Marine Atlantic Ferry Service* from Souris, P.E.I. to the Magdalen Islands, P.Q. carried 108,129 passengers and 41,748 vehicles during 275 voyages in 2004. This was down by 7.4 per cent, 5.6 per cent and 3.8 per cent from 2003, respectively. The number of passengers taking the *Northumberland Ferries Ltd.* service between Wood Islands, P.E.I. and Caribou, N.S. fell from 444,052 in 2003 to 410,328 in 2004, a decrease of 7.6 per cent. At the same time 176,540 vehicles of all kinds were transported, compared to 171,482 in 2003 for an increase of 2.9 per cent.

For two consecutive years, the total number of passengers travelling through Charlottetown Airport has been on the increase. In 2004, 83,137 passengers flew into Prince Edward Island (up 2.5 per cent from 2003), while 85,860 people left the province by air (up by 4.2 per cent). Total air passenger traffic was up by 3.4 per cent compared to 2003.

The volume of product received at Island seaports in 2004, including fertilizer, sand, stone and gravel, had a total weight of 613,575 metric tonnes, down by 6.7 per cent from 2003. During the same period 87,710 metric tonnes of water freight, mainly potatoes and wood products, left the province. This was 38.6 per cent higher compared to 2003.

### ***The Public Service Sector***

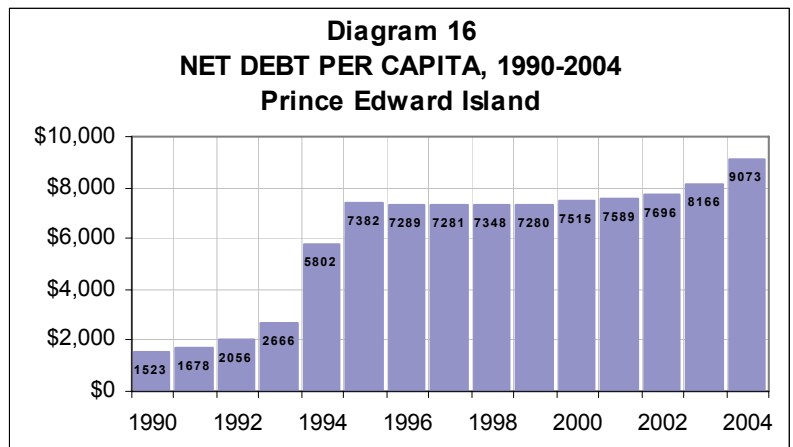
According to Statistics Canada, in 2004 the public service sector accounted for 27 per cent of provincial chained GDP by industry and 29.7 per cent of total Island employment. Real public sector GDP in chained 1997 dollars rose from \$818.9 million in 2003 to \$839.1 million in 2004, an increase of 2.5 per cent compared to 3.5 per cent growth last year.

Statistics Canada's *Survey of Employment, Earnings and Hours* (SEPH) indicates that employment in *public administration* (federal, provincial and municipal) fell by 4.4 per cent in 2004. *Education* services experienced job growth of 1.5 per cent that year, while employment in the *health and social services* sector increased by 13.7 per cent.

### ***Provincial Finance***

In fiscal year (FY) 2003/04, total revenue received for the Province of Prince Edward Island was 4.9 per cent higher than in FY 2002/03, at \$996.3 million. Provincial tax revenues were valued at \$597.6 million in FY 2003/04, virtually the same as in FY 2002/03. Total federal transfers to Prince Edward Island contributed 39 per cent to the province's total revenue in FY 2003/04 compared to 35 per cent in the last fiscal year. Equalization payments increased by 9.6 per cent to value \$243.8 million, while Canada Health and Social Transfer (CHST) payments advanced 15.9 per cent to total \$103.8 million that fiscal year. Total expenditures increased by 12 per cent to reach \$1,126.7 million in FY 2003/04.

The provincial *Public Accounts* indicate that the deficit on the Operating Fund for FY 2003/04 was \$130.4 million (after pension/retirement benefit and capital expenditure adjustments) compared to a deficit of \$71.2 million in FY 2002/03. As of March 31, 2004, the provincial net debt was \$1,250 million, up 11.7 per cent from 2003.

Diagram 16 shows that, while every Islander owed \$1,523 in 1990, by 2004 this debt load had grown to \$9,073 per person.

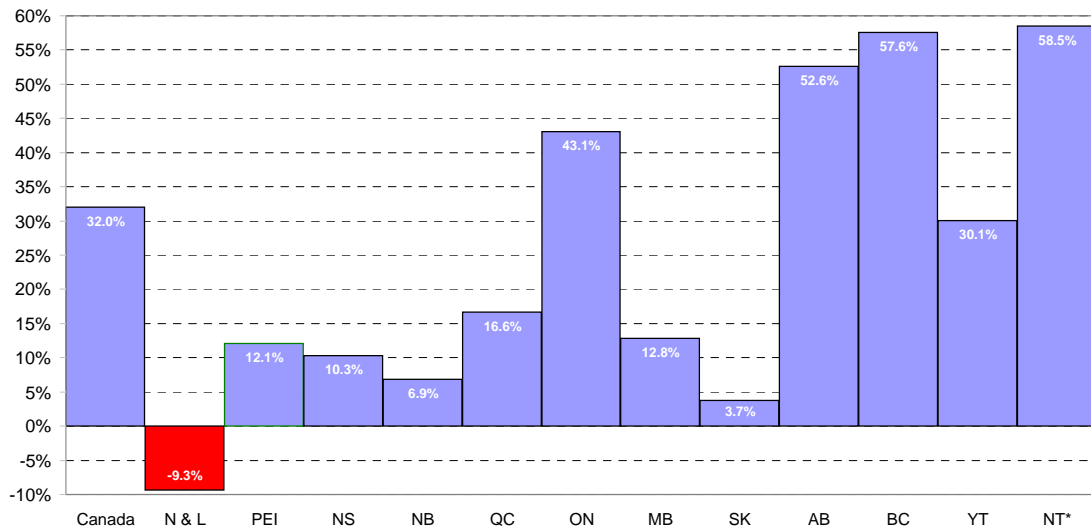

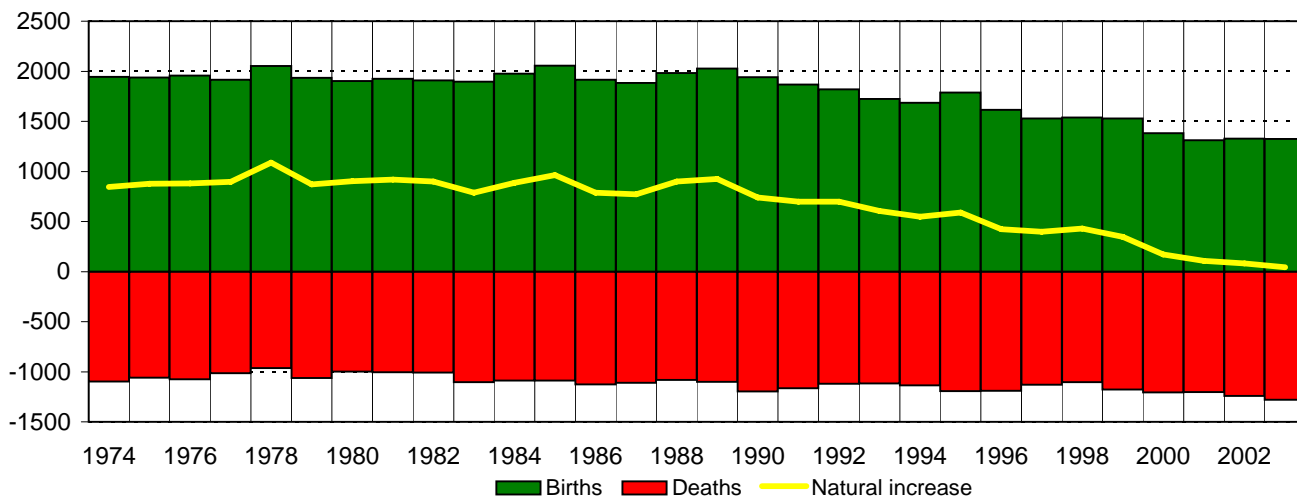

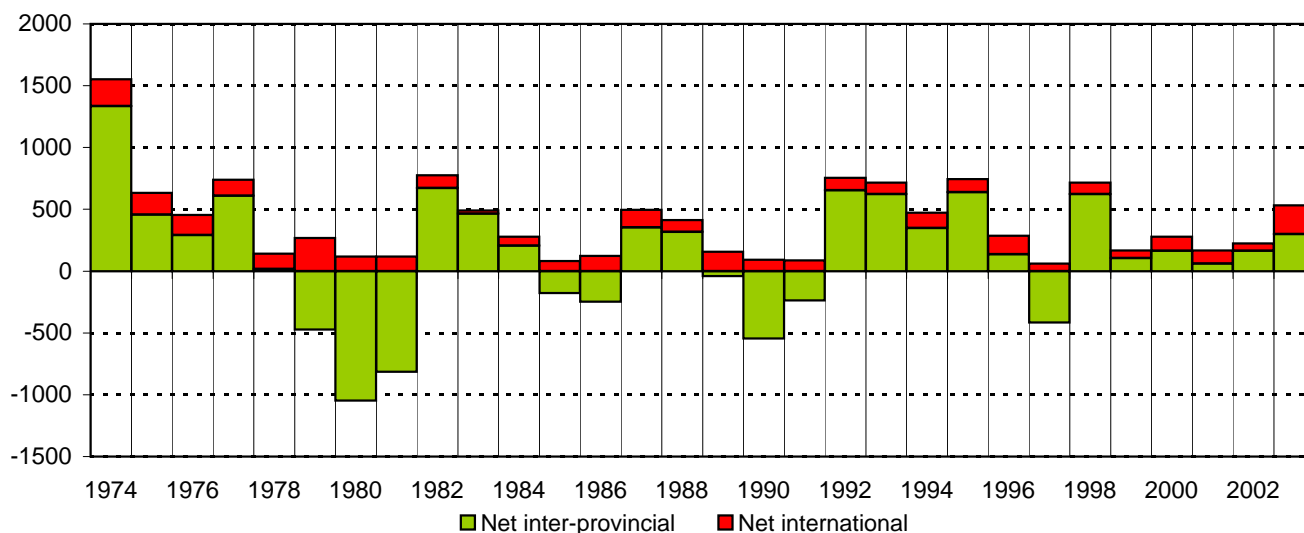

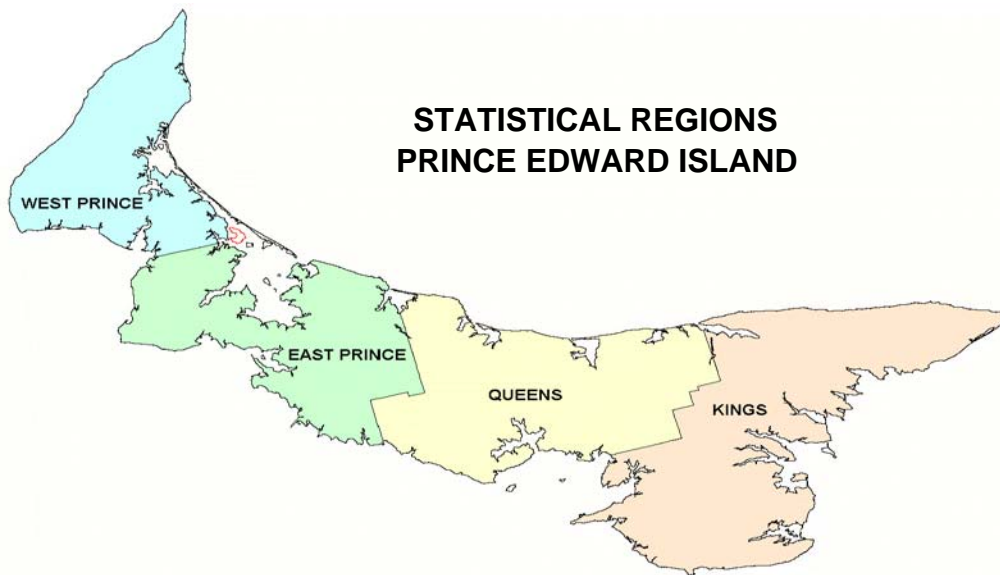

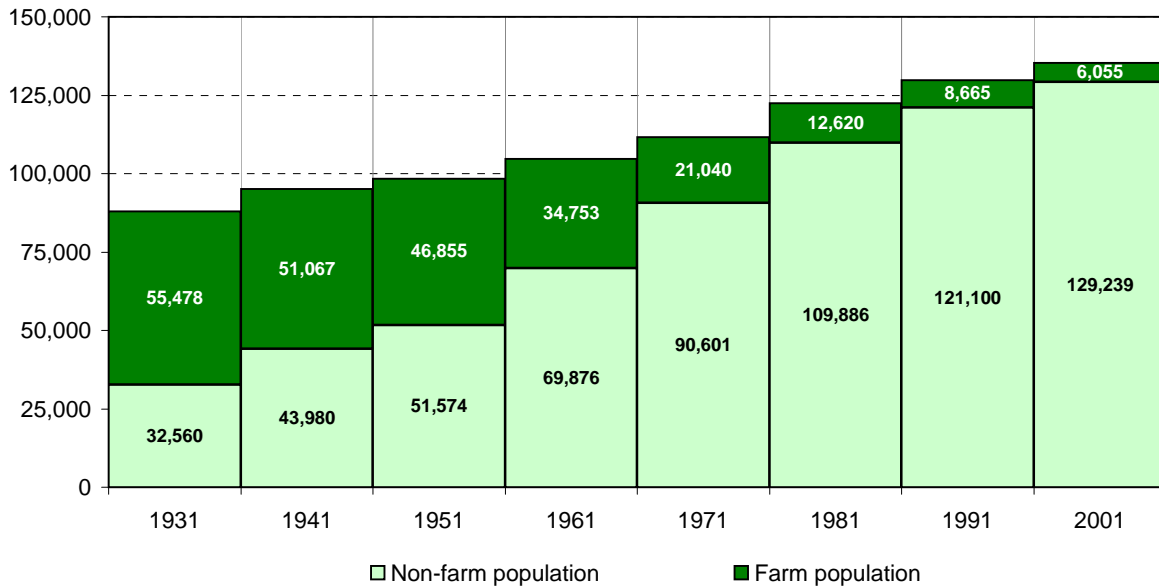

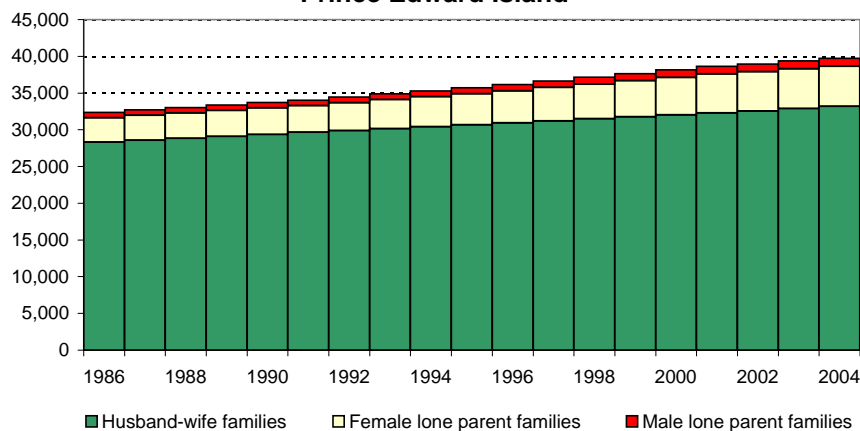

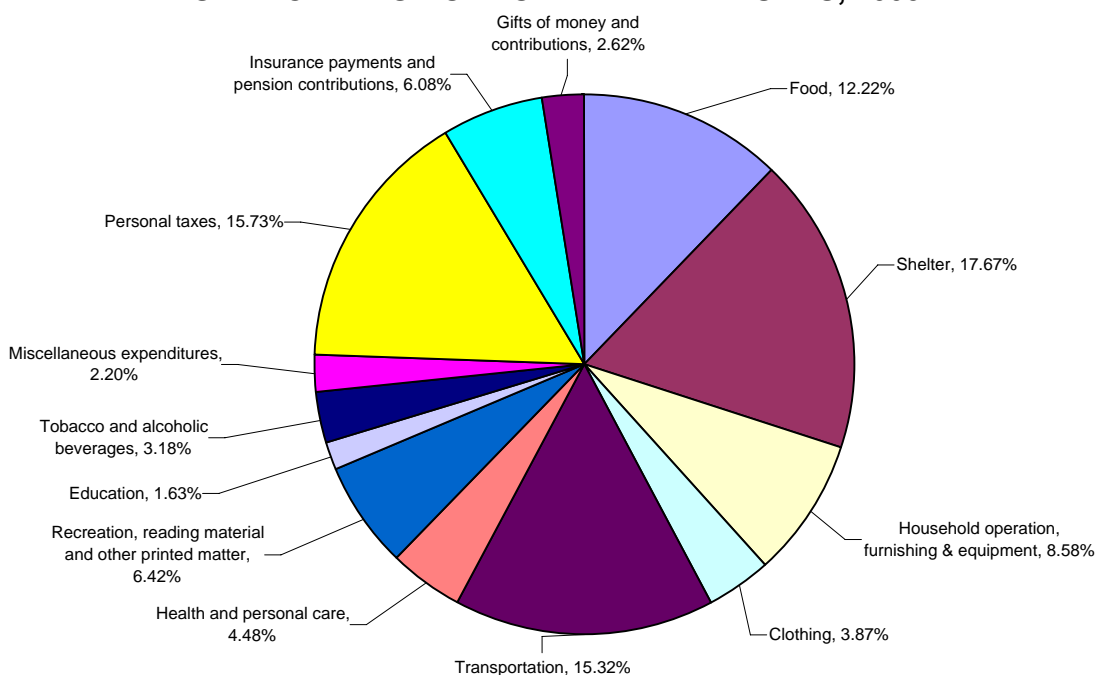

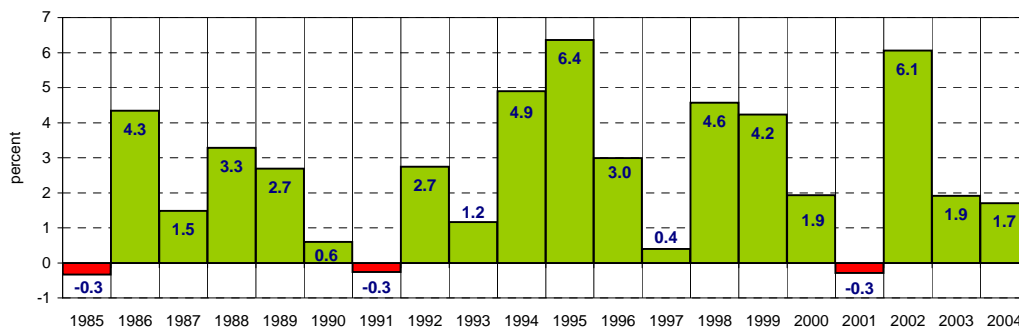

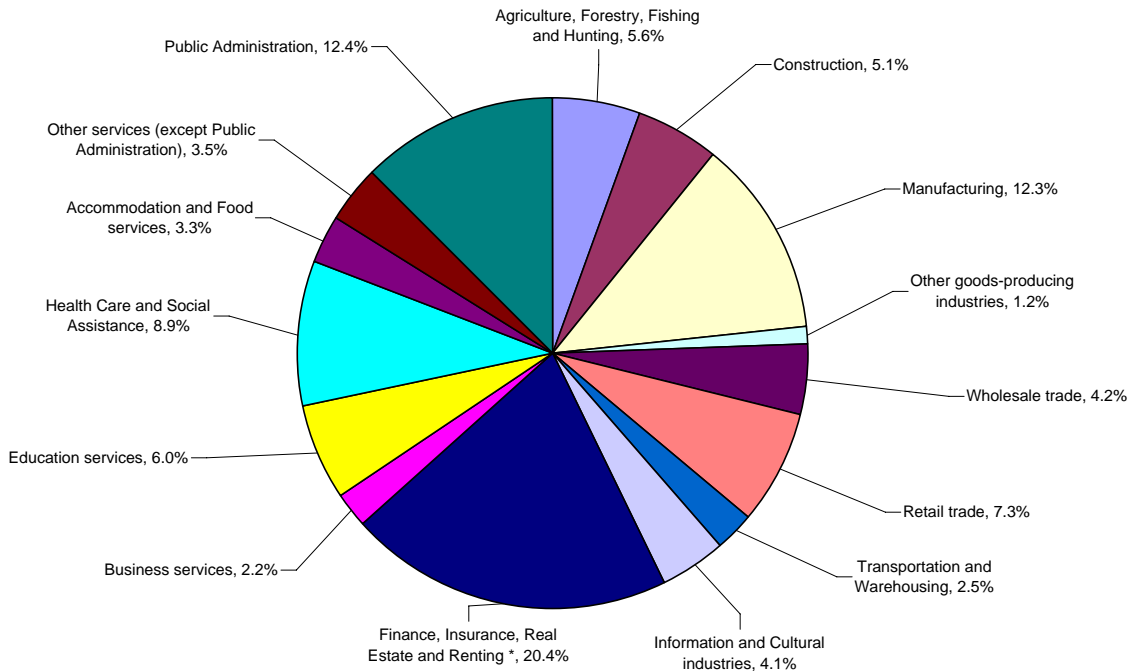
