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# **Foreword**

The 2013 Annual Statistical Review is a snapshot of the Island's economy, population and social make-up. There are a number of interesting facts found throughout its more than 100 data tables, including details of our province's economic performance in 2013.

These data tables give us current, as well as historic, socio-economic information about Prince Edward Island. Over the years, we have found it to be an indispensable reference on the Island population and its economy. As a government, we use the information found in the Annual Statistical Review to make some important policy decisions. It helps us determine where, and when, programs and services are needed.



The information within the Annual Statistical Review is compiled from a variety of sources, including, provincial government departments, the private sector and Statistics Canada.

The information we receive from Statistics Canada is important, and significant. I remain concerned about the federal government's decision to abolish the mandatory long-form census in 2011 and their plan to repeat the voluntary National Household Survey for the 2016 Census. Our Island communities are now realizing that data gathered through the voluntary National Household Survey is not as accurate and complete as it was under the mandatory long-form census.

Despite this ongoing challenge, the people within our Statistics Bureau were able to gather enough facts and figures to complete a 2013 Review. I would like to personally thank them for their hard work and diligence.



# A Historical Note

Before the European explorations, Prince Edward Island was frequently used by the Mi'kmaq People for fishing, hunting and some planting. The Mi'kmaq called the island Epekwitk, meaning "cradle on the waves." Europeans later changed the pronunciation of the name to Abegweit. Historians credit the European discovery of the Island to Jacques Cartier, the French navigator, who claimed the Island for Francis I, King of France, on July 1, 1534. In 1720 the Island, then called Île Saint Jean, was colonized by 300 French settlers, sponsored by a commercial company of the Comte de Saint Pierre. The Island was ceded to Great Britain in 1763. Two years later the designated capital city of the Island of St. John took on the name Charlotte Town in honour of Queen Charlotte, wife of King George III of England. In 1799 the colony was renamed Prince Edward Island in honour of Edward, Duke of Kent, who was then commander of the British forces in North America. Prince Edward Island is known as the "Cradle of Confederation", because the Charlottetown Conference, held there in 1864, initiated the movement toward Canada's federation. The Island became a province in 1873.

The Armorial Bearings¹ of the Province of Prince Edward Island, shown above, were proclaimed to come into force on December 13, 2002. The centrepiece is the Shield of Arms, granted by King Edward VII in 1905, featuring the English heraldic lion, a large oak tree on the right and three young saplings on the left. The mature tree originally represented England, while the three saplings stand for the three counties - Kings, Queens and Prince. Scrolled along the bottom of the Shield of Arms are the Latin words Parva Sub Ingenti, which, when translated, read: The small under the protection of the great. The surrounding elements of the Armorial Bearings illustrate significant characteristics of the province, its position in the Canadian federation, its founding peoples and its natural resources.



Winter is the ideal time for sighting the Blue Jay, its shrill cries cutting the silence of the crisp winter air.



#### Samuel Holland's Survey of the Island of St. John

Captain Samuel J. Holland surveyed and mapped Prince Edward Island, then known as the Island of St. John, between 1764 and 1766. During the survey, Holland used innovative instruments such as the astronomical clock and the refracting telescope. His work was so accurate that many of the boundaries for lots and parishes he mapped are still used today. (Image: National Library and Archives Canada).

# **Economic Review 2013**

#### Overview

GDP by industry for Prince Edward Island expanded by 1.4 per cent in 2013. Leading growth sectors in the province were (in 2002 chained prices): manufacturing (up by \$23.8 million or 6.3 per cent), real estate and rental and leasing (up by \$13.8 million or 2.2 per cent), finance and insurance (up by \$12.3 million or 5.2 per cent), and agriculture, forestry, fishing and hunting (up by \$7.0 million or 2.6 per cent). Sectors showing the largest declines were construction (down by \$9.6 million or 3.6 per cent), utilities (down by \$3.1 million or 5.8 per cent), management of companies and enterprises (down by \$1.9 million or 5.7 per cent) and public administration (down by \$1.7 million or 0.3 per cent).

GDP Income and Expenditure tables for 2013 are expected to be released by Statistics Canada in the fall of 2014. Statistics Canada estimates that real GDP growth for PEI in 2012 was 1.5 per cent, the fastest growth in the Atlantic region. Growth between 2011 and 2012 was largely the result of a 3.7 per cent increase in exports. Final domestic demand decreased 0.6 per cent, while household consumption expenditures increased 1.0 per cent. Government gross fixed capital formation declined 15.0 per cent as several major projects were completed. Business investment increased 1.9 per cent, while imports increased 2.7 per cent. Real gross domestic product was revised down for 2010 and 2011 to 2.2 per cent and 1.0 per cent respectively.


The change in the All-Items Consumer Price Index (CPI) for Prince Edward Island was 2.0 per cent in 2013. Leading factors contributing to this were higher prices for energy (up by 4.4 per cent), food (up by 1.0 per cent), and shelter (up by 2.4 per cent). In Canada, prices increased by 0.9 per cent in 2013.

Employment on Prince Edward Island increased by 1.8 per cent in 2013 to average 74,100 for the year, a new all time high. Total labour income increased by 1.8 per cent. The unemployment rate averaged 11.5 per cent in 2013, up 0.2 percentage points from 2012. According to the Survey of Employment, Payrolls and Hours, employment on Prince Edward Island declined by 1.8 per cent in 2013.

Manufacturing shipments on Prince Edward Island increased by 9.6 per cent to \$1,433.1 million in 2013, up from \$1,307.8 in 2012. According to Industry Canada, the value of P.E.I.'s international exports of goods rose by 6.3 per cent in 2013 to \$926.1 million, following a 15.4 per cent increase in 2012.

# The Canadian Economy

Statistics Canada estimates that the Canadian economy expanded by 2.0 per cent in 2013. This compares to a 1.7 per cent increase in 2012 and a 2.5 per cent increase in 2011. Diagram 1 shows quarterly real GDP growth between 2010 and 2013.




Since emerging from recession in the third quarter of 2009, the Canadian Economy had

seven quarters of economic growth, one quarter of contraction in the second quarter of 2011, followed by ten more quarters of growth. Through 2013, growth has been supported by all major industries except manufacturing. Goods production grew 1.7 per cent in 2013 led by mining and oil and gas extraction, and agriculture. The service sector grew 2.1 per cent in 2013, led by finance and insurance, the public sector, accommodation and food services and wholesale and retail trade.

The consumer price index increased 0.9 per cent in 2013. Increases were seen across all components, with the exception of health and personal care. Notable gains were in energy, up 1.5 per cent, shelter, up 1.3 per cent, food, up 1.2 per cent, and transportation, up 0.7 per cent. Core inflation was 0.9 per cent in 2013.


Employment gains were recorded in both the goods and service sectors, at 0.3 and 1.6 per cent respectively. Notable employment gains include trade, up 2.3 per cent, construction, up 4.4 per cent, and health care and social assistance, up 2.3 per cent. Notable declines occurred in manufacturing, down 2.9 per cent, other services, down 3.2 per cent and public administration, down 1.1 per cent. The unemployment rate averaged 7.1 per cent in 2013, a decline of 0.1 percentage points from 2012. Diagram 2 shows percent employment change in Canada by sector.



# The American Economy


After growing by 2.8 per cent in 2012, real GDP increased 1.9 per cent in 2013. The deceleration in growth was largely caused by the fiscal drag that occurred as a result of the spending sequesters introduced March 1, 2013. Imports also increased over this period. Growth in GDP was widespread with positive contributions coming from personal consumption expenditures, exports, non-residential and residential fixed investment, and private inventory investment.

The employment situation in the United States continues to improve. After expanding by 1.7 per cent in 2012, average non-farm payroll employment grew by 1.7 per cent in 2013, or 2.3 million jobs. Job gains, though modest, have been sustained month to month, with employment growing every month since October 2010. Though the situation is improving, employment remains approximately 1.6 million jobs below its pre-recession peak recorded in 2007.



After peaking in 2010 at 9.6 per cent, the average annual unemployment rate continues to trend downward in the United States, finishing 2013 with an average of 7.4 per cent, as shown in diagram 3. Unemployment has been under 8.0 per cent since September of 2012, and finished 2013 at 6.7 per cent in December. This is still markedly higher than in the years prior to the recession. The number of unemployed persons as of December 2013 was 12.2 million. Of those people, the long term unemployed, those who have been out of work for more than 27 weeks, account for 4.8 million or nearly 40 per cent of the total unemployed.

# The Prince Edward Island Economy




#### Gross Domestic Product

Statistics Canada preliminary estimates of GDP by Industry indicate that the Prince Edward Island economy expanded by 1.4 per cent in chained 2007 dollars in 2013, following 1.4 per cent growth in 2012 and 1.0 per cent growth in 2011. Diagram 4 shows growth in provincial Gross Domestic Product (GDP) by Industry since 2002. For more information about GDP see Tables 37 to 43.<sup>2</sup>

#### Consumer Prices

The All-Items Consumer Price Index for Prince Edward Island increased by 2.0 per cent in 2013, compared to a rise of 0.9 per cent nationally. Core inflation, the year-over-year rate of change of the CPI excluding food, energy and the effects of changes in indirect taxes, rose by 1.8 per cent in 2013.

Energy prices continued to rise in 2013, up 4.4 per cent as compared to 3.2 per cent in 2012. Diagram 5 shows the annual average price of unleaded gasoline and fuel oil sold on Prince Edward Island between 2006 and 2013. Gasoline prices (regular self-serve) averaged \$1.295 per litre for 2013, the highest ever average annual price for gasoline on PEI. Prices peaked at \$1.365 per litre in August, the highest price since July 2008. Prices declined for the following two months before rising once again




to finish the year at \$1.301 per litre in December. The price of home heating oil averaged \$1.106 per litre in 2013, ranging from a high of \$1.185 per litre in March to a low \$1.016 per litre in June. #### Labour Force

The annual average of total employment on Prince Edward Island increased by 1.1 per cent from 72,000 in 2011 to 72,800 in 2012. Employment in the goods-producing sector decreased by 1.1 per cent in 2012, while employment in the service providing sector increased by 1.7 per cent.





Diagram 6 indicates that a total of 1,400 jobs were created in business and financial services, transportation and warehousing, health, education, and public administration, other services, primary industries, and utilities in 2012. The remaining sectors accounted for a loss of 600 jobs.<sup>3</sup> The labour force participation rate decreased slightly from 68.1 per cent in 2011 to 68.0 per cent in 2012. The annual average unemployment rate has remained steady for three years, going from 11.2 per cent in 2010 to 11.3 per cent in 2011 and remaining at 11.3 per cent in 2012. Statistics Canada's Survey of Employment, Payrolls and Hours shows that employment on Prince Edward Island decreased by 0.7 per cent in 2012, the first annual decline according to that measure since 2006. The largest declines were seen in management services, administrative support, and health and social services. Sectors showing the most growth were accommodation and food services, manufacturing, and professional services. For more information about the labour force see Tables 16 to 22.

#### Income

Statistics Canada estimates that labour income for Prince Edward Island rose 1.8 per cent to reach \$2,940 million in 2013. Diagram 7 shows labour income growth from 2003 to 2013. The major contributors to growth in 2013 were in professional and personal services (up by 4.7 per cent), public administration (up by 2.5 per cent), and transportation and storage (up by 11.8 per cent). #### **Population**

On July 1, 2013, the population of Prince Edward Island was estimated at 145,273, an increase of 72 persons or 0.05 per cent over 2012. The population of Canada increased by 1.2 per cent over the same period. Preliminary data show that 863 immigrants chose Prince Edward Island as their new home in 2012/13 while 161 emigrants left the Island, resulting in a total of 716 for net international migration. Net interprovincial migration was -1,074, with Ontario, Alberta, and New Brunswick being the top destinations of Islanders leaving for other provinces. Between July 1, 2012 and June 30, 2013 the total number of Island births was an estimated 1,440. The number of deaths was estimated to be 1,287, an increase of 2.1 per cent. Thus population growth by natural increase amounted to 153 during that period.

The aging of the Island population is illustrated by the fact that the median age<sup>4</sup> has risen from 25.5 years in 1973 to 43.1 years in 2013. Furthermore, while 11.1 per cent of the population was 65 years and older in 1973, this proportion had risen to 17.3 per cent in 2013.


According to the 2011 Census of Population count on May 10, 2011 there were 140,204 persons living on Prince Edward Island. #### **Industrial Profiles**

## Manufacturing

Diagram 8 shows total manufacturing shipments for Prince Edward Island from 2008 to 2013. Total shipments increased by 11.8 per cent in 2013 to a value of \$1,456 million. This follows increases in both 2011 and 2012. Fish product shipments increased by 6.0 per cent over 2012 to value \$154 million. Employment in the manufacturing sector fell by 2.0 per cent in 2013, the sixth straight year of employment decline in this sector. The number of employed persons in the manufacturing sector was 4,900.

## Exports

According to Industry Canada, the total value of exported goods grew from \$870.9 million in 2012 to \$926.1 million in 2013, an increase of 6.3 per cent. Exports of frozen food products made up 24.0 per cent of all international exports of goods in 2013. Its value increased from \$208.8 million in 2012 to \$222.1 million in 2013, an increase of 6.4 per cent. Other exports included seafood products valued at \$146.4 million (up by 4.0 per cent from 2012), \$65.9 million in vegetable and melon farming exports, (up by 10.3 per cent) and \$65.3 million in aerospace products and parts (up by 2.8 per cent). 
## Agriculture

Farm cash receipts for 2013 totaled \$497.0 million, an increase of 3.0 per cent over 2012. This compares to an increase of 1.1 per cent for Canada as a whole. Total crop receipts totaled \$321.7 million, an increase of 1.0 per cent over 2012, due to increases in grains, fruits and other crops. Potato receipts remained at a historically high level in 2013, declining slightly by 0.6 per cent. Total livestock receipts grew for the fourth consecutive year, increasing by 0.8 per cent. Cattle receipts increased by 5.6 per cent, while hog receipts declined by 7.8 per cent. Dairy receipts also saw an increase, rising slightly by 0.2 per cent.

#### Retail Trade


Retail sales on Prince Edward Island in 2012 increased for the third year in a row with a 3.4 per cent increase. Diagram 9 shows retails sales since 2002. Sales were valued at \$1,931.6 million. Higher food prices were reflected in a 3.9 per cent increase in sales at supermarkets with sales of \$372.7 million. Motor vehicle and parts dealers also saw a significant increase, up 11.9 per cent or \$41.3 million. Sales were



down at gasoline stations (down 0.5 per cent or \$1.4 million) and pharmacies and personal care stores (down 2.9 per cent or \$4.1 million). The number of new vehicles sold saw an increase of 805 vehicles with a total of 6,600 vehicles sold, an all time high for new vehicles sold on PEI. The value of new vehicles sold was \$178.1 million (up 9.7 per cent), also an all time high. Employment in the wholesale/retail trade sector decreased by 3.0 per cent to 9,700 people in 2012. Employment in this sector remains the largest private sector employer in the province. For information about the retail trade sector see Tables 47 and 48.

## Fisheries and Forestry

The Department of Fisheries, Aquaculture and Rural Development estimates that the value of total fish landings in 2013 declined by 9.2 per cent to \$154.8 million. Molluscs and crustaceans continue to be the top species of the Island fishery comprising 94.4 per cent of the total value of all fish landings. Although lobster landings increased by 3.9 per cent to reach a record 28.4 million pounds, the value of lobster landings decreased by 19.7 per cent in 2013, to value \$91.4 million. After seeing increases in 2011 and 2012, lobster prices



declined by 28.6 per cent in 2013 to \$3.00/lb, the lowest price since 1993. The value of other crustaceans and molluscs increased by 20.7 per cent in 2013. Diagram 10 shows the value of lobster landings on PEI from 2004 to 2013.

Landings of groundfish, pelagic and estuarial fish were 15.7 per cent lower than last year, falling to 19.8 million pounds, the third straight year of decline. Prices decreased in 2013 for cod (down by 14.8 per cent to 95.4 cents/lb.), herring (down by 23.0 per cent to 20.8 cents/lb.), mackerel (down by 25.7 per cent to 34.2 cents/lb.), smelts (down by 32.3 per cent to 75.8 cents/lb.), snow crab (down by 9.8 per cent to \$2.25/lb.), and oysters (down by 4.8 per cent to \$1.20/lb.). Higher prices were seen for hake (up by 45.6 per cent to 52.4 cents/lb.), rock crab (up by 8.2 per cent to 48.7 cents/lb.) and mussels (up by 12.1 per cent to 65.0 cents/lb.). The P.E.I. Department of Environment, Energy and Forestry estimates that the total volume of wood harvested on Prince Edward Island increased from 386,000 cubic metres in 2011 to 483,000 cubic metres in 2012, an increase of 25.1 per cent<sup>5</sup>. Industrial wood production increased by 7.9 per cent in 2012, while the consumption of fuel wood and fuel chips increased by 30.3 per cent. For more data see Table 73.

#### **Tourism**


Cruise ship passengers to the Island increased by 38.0 per cent, with 69 ships bringing just over 93,000 passengers to the Island. Occupancy rates at Island accommodations decreased by 1.8 percentage points, while the number of overnight stays increased by 0.1 per cent. Campgrounds continued to do well in 2013, with sight nights sold up 6.1 per cent and the occupancy rate up 2.7 percentage points. Air traffic declined by 0.3 per cent in 2013, while ferry traffic<sup>6</sup> fell by 2.2 per cent. Bridge traffic decreased by 0.7 per cent.

## Construction and Investment

Statistics Canada estimates that total investment on Prince Edward Island was \$969.8 million in 2013, an increase of 7.8 per cent over the previous year. Public sector investment increased from \$269.1 million in 2012 to \$311.2 million in 2013, an increase of 15.6 per cent, while private sector investment grew by 4.5 per cent, from \$630.5 million in 2012 to \$658.6 million in 2013.

Non-residential investment declined by 13.0 per cent in 2013, due mainly to a 45.9 per cent decrease in industrial investment. Government and Institutional investment saw an increase of 4.6 per cent, while commercial investment was down 10.3 per cent.



Residential investment decreased 2.1 per cent in 2013, largely due to decreased investment in singles and row housing, which declined by 17.6 per cent and 20.2 per cent respectively. Investment in doubles increased by 32.4 per cent, while investment in apartments increased by 9.3 per cent.

The Canada Mortgage and Housing Corporation (CMHC) estimated that there were 636 new housing starts on Prince

Edward Island in 2013, a decline of 32.4 per cent. As seen in Diagram 11, row housing decreased from 127 starts in 2012 to 36 in 2013. The number of semi-detached and duplex starts also decreased, from 94 in 2012 to 71 in 2013. Single dwelling housing starts fell in 2013, going from 387 in 2012 to 282 in 2013, a decrease of 27.1 per cent.

## **Transportation**

The total number of passengers travelling through Charlottetown Airport decreased slightly in 2013, falling from 297,329 in 2012 to 296,301 or 0.3 per cent. 146,835 passengers flew into Prince Edward Island (down 0.8 per cent from 2012), while 149,466 people left the province by air (up by 0.1 per cent).

#### The Public Service Sector

Statistics Canada's Survey of Employment, Earnings and Hours (SEPH) indicates that employment in public administration (federal, provincial and municipal) decreased by 1.5 per cent in 2013. Employment in the health and social services sector decreased by 4.9 per cent, while employment in the education sector decreased by 2.3 per cent.

#### **Provincial Finance**

The provincial Public Accounts, Consolidated Statement of Operations shows that the Province of Prince Edward Island received \$1,597.0 million in total revenue in fiscal year (FY) 2012/13, 0.6 per cent higher than in FY 2011/12. Provincial own-source revenues were valued at \$990.4 million that year, an increase of 4.9 per cent from a year earlier. Total federal transfers to Prince Edward Island contributed 37.3 per cent to the province's total revenue in FY 2012/13 compared to 39.7 per cent in the last fiscal year. Equalization payments increased by 2.4 per cent to value \$337.1 million, while Canada Health and Social Transfer (CHST) payments advanced 3.1 per cent to total \$170.5 million that fiscal year. Total expenditures rose by 0.3 per cent to reach \$1,676 million.

The Consolidated Statement of Operations also shows a deficit for FY 2012/13 in the amount of \$78.6 million. As of March 31, 2013 the provincial net debt was \$2,039.6 million, up 6.9 per cent from 2012. More data on the government sector can be found at Tables 110 to 114.










