

A Historical Note

Before the European explorations, Prince Edward Island was frequently used by the Mi'kmaq People for fishing, hunting and some planting. The Mi'kmaq called the island *Epekwitk*, meaning "cradle on the waves." Europeans later changed the pronunciation of the name to *Abegweit*. Historians credit the European discovery of the Island to Jacques Cartier, the French navigator, who claimed the Island for Francis I, King of France, on July 1, 1534. In 1720 the Island, then called *Île Saint Jean*, was colonized by 300 French settlers, sponsored by a commercial company of the Comte de Saint Pierre. The Island was ceded to Great Britain in 1763. Two years later the designated capital city of the *Island of St. John* took on the name *Charlotte Town* in honour of Queen Charlotte, wife of King George III of England. In 1799 the colony was renamed Prince Edward Island in honour of Edward, Duke of Kent, who was then commander of the British forces in North America. Prince Edward Island is known as the "Cradle of Confederation", because the Charlottetown Conference, held there in 1864, initiated the movement toward Canada's federation. The Island became a province in 1873.

The Armorial Bearings ¹ of the Province of Prince Edward Island, shown above, were proclaimed to come into force on December 13, 2002. The centrepiece is the Shield of Arms, granted by King Edward VII in 1905, featuring the English heraldic lion, a large oak tree on the right and three young saplings on the left. The mature tree originally represented England, while the three saplings stand for the three counties - Kings, Queens and Prince. Scrolled along the bottom of the Shield of Arms are the Latin words *Parva Sub Ingenti*, which, when translated, read: *The small under the protection of the great*. The surrounding elements of the Armorial Bearings illustrate significant characteristics of the province, its position in the Canadian federation, its founding peoples and its natural resources.



Samuel Holland's Survey of the Island of St. John

Captain Samuel J. Holland surveyed and mapped Prince Edward Island, then known as the Island of St. John, between 1764 and 1766. During the survey, Holland used innovative instruments such as the astronomical clock and the refracting telescope. Economic Review 2022

Overview

For the first time since the beginning of the pandemic, 2022 began with minimal COVID-19 health measures in place and hope for a more widespread economic recovery. As the year progressed, factors other than the pandemic came to dominate the economic landscape, including the war in Ukraine, ongoing supply chain issues, and inflation at its highest level in 40 years. Higher prices, higher interest rates, labour scarcity and a housing shortage became new challenges facing governments, businesses and individuals. In September 2022, Hurricane Fiona caused widespread damage and hardship across the Island with costal landscapes and harbours destroyed, trees downed and widespread power and telecommunication outages. The cleanup and repair effort compounded already existing material and labour shortages, as well as demand for physical goods that had already exceeded supply. Despite these challenges, the economic fundamentals of the province remained solid. Population growth more than made up for the pandemic-induced slowdown and was a steady supply of additional labour to the province throughout the year. Demand for the goods and services produced on the Island remained as robust as ever.

GDP by industry for Prince Edward Island expanded by 2.9 per cent in 2022. Increases were recorded in 13 of the 20 major industry groups. Notable leading growth sectors in the province were (in 2012 chained prices) manufacturing (up by \$43.2 million or 6.6 per cent), accommodation and food services (up by \$37.1 million or 22.0 per cent), and public administration (up by \$35.6 million or 4.6 per cent). Notable declines occurred in construction (down by \$14.8 million or 3.1 per cent), agriculture, forestry, fishing and hunting (down by \$11.3 million or 2.7 per cent), and wholesale trade (down by \$9.2 million or 6.5 per cent).

GDP Income and Expenditure tables for 2022 are expected to be released by Statistics Canada in the fall of 2023.


According to the Labour Force Survey, employment on Prince Edward Island increased by 5.4 per cent to average 84,200 for the year, following a 4.0 per cent increase in 2021. The unemployment rate averaged 7.6 per cent in 2022, down 2.1 percentage points from 2021. According to the Survey of Employment, Payrolls and Hours, employment on Prince Edward Island was up by 7.2 per cent in 2022 while total labour income increased by 10.0 per cent.

The *All-Items Consumer Price Index* (CPI) for Prince Edward Island was up 8.8 per cent in 2022 compared to 2021. Energy prices increased 37.5 per cent, while food prices increased 9.7 per cent and shelter was up by 12.8 per cent. The *All-Items CPI* for Canada increased by 6.8 per cent in 2022.

Manufacturing shipments on Prince Edward Island reached \$3.0 billion in 2022, increasing by 16.8 per cent over 2021. This follows a rise of 15.5 per cent in 2021. According to Industry Canada, the value of P.E.I.'s international exports of goods rose by 17.2 per cent in 2022 to reach \$2.0 billion, a new all time high. This follows increases of 1.1 per cent and 12.6 per cent and in 2020 and 2021 respectively.

The Canadian Economy

Nationally, economic growth slowed in 2022, rising 3.4 per cent following 5.0 per cent growth in 2021. Moderate growth over the first three quarters of 2022 became stagnant during the fourth quarter. Statistics Canada estimates that the Canadian economy contracted by 5.1 per cent in 2020 and expanded by 5.0 per cent in 2021. Diagram 1 shows quarterly real GDP growth between 2019 and 2022.



Exports of goods and services increased by 2.6 per cent, following a 1.4 per cent increase in 2021. Household final consumption expenditure rose by 4.8 per cent growth following 5.1 per cent growth in 2021.⁴

GDP for goods producing industries increased by 3.3 per cent in 2022 while service producing industries rose 3.7 per cent. Notable increases included *professional, scientific and technical services*, up 7.3 per cent,



accommodation and food services, up 22.8 per cent, manufacturing, up 3.8 per cent, transportation and warehousing, up 9.2 per cent, and mining, quarrying, and oil and gas extraction up 3.6 per cent⁵.

The all-items consumer price index for Canada increased 6.8 per cent in 2022. Notable increases were in *energy*, up 22.5 per cent, *transportation*, up 10.6 per cent, *food*, up 8.9 per cent, *shelter*, up 6.9 per cent, and *recreation*, *reading and education*, up 4.7 per cent. Core inflation (all items excluding food and energy) was 5.0 per cent in 2022.⁶ As commodity prices increased, the Canadian dollar exchange rate also rose steadily throughout 2022, averaging \$1.30 US. This was mainly due to the strength of the US dollar.

Employment increased by 4.0 per cent to 19.7 million, while the unemployment rate averaged 5.3 per cent in 2022, a decrease of 2.2 percentage points from 2021.⁷ Employment gains were recorded in both the services sector (up 3.9 per cent) and the goods sector (up 3.0 per cent). Employment was up in every major sector, with the exception of *business*, *building*, *and other support services*, which was unchanged, and *other services* (down 1.1 per cent). Notable employment growth occurred in *professional*, *scientific and technical services*, up 7.2 per cent, *wholesale and retail trade*, up 3.7 per cent, and *information*, *culture*, and recreation, up 12.6 per cent.⁸ Diagram 2 shows percent employment change in Canada by sector.





The American Economy

Real GDP growth in the United States slowed in 2022, increasing 2.1 per cent, following 5.9 per cent growth in 2021. The increase in GDP for 2022 was mainly due to increases in consumer spending, exports, private inventory investment, and nonresidential fixed investment that were partly offset by decreases in residential fixed investment and federal government spending, along with an increase in imports. Diagram 3 shows U.S. GDP growth from 2013 to 2022.



Employment in the United States grew by 5.7 per cent in 2022 and the unemployment rate fell by 1.8 percentage points from 5.4 per cent in 2021 to 3.6 per cent.¹⁰ Diagram 4 shows U.S. employment and unemployment rate from 2013 to 2022.



The Prince Edward Island Economy

Following growth of 7.9 per cent in 2021, which was driven largely by the COVID-19 rebound, economic growth for PEI slowed to 2.9 per cent in 2022. The Island continued to be a destination for international and inter-provincial migrants, pushing population growth to a record 3.6 per cent. This in turn had an impact on the growth in domestic demand. Employment reached an all-time high in 2022, with the unemployment rate falling to an all-time low. New records were also set in retail trade, merchandise exports and capital expenditures. Like other jurisdictions, the Island saw rising inflation and supply chain challenges that continued to be a lingering feature of the pandemic.

Gross Domestic Product

Statistics Canada preliminary estimates of GDP by Industry indicate that the Prince Edward Island economy grew by 2.9 per cent in chained 2012 dollars in 2022, following growth of 7.9 per cent in 2021 and a 1.7 per cent contraction in 2020. Diagram 5 shows growth in provincial Gross Domestic Product (GDP) by Industry since 2013. For more information about GDP see Tables 39 to 45. Consumer Prices


The *All-Items Consumer Price Index* for Prince Edward Island increased 8.8 per cent in 2022, following a 5.1 per cent increase in 2021. This was the highest inflation since 1981. Core inflation, the year-over-year rate of change of the CPI excluding food, energy, and the effects of changes in indirect taxes, rose by 5.0

per cent in 2022. Food prices increased by 9.7 per cent over 2021, while shelter prices rose by 12.8 per cent. The CPI Energy index increased 37.5 per cent in 2022 following a rise of 26.6 per cent in 2021. ¹³

Diagram 6 shows the annual average price of unleaded gasoline and fuel oil sold on Prince Edward Island between 2015 and 2022. Gasoline prices (regular self-serve) averaged \$1.754 per litre for 2022. Prices began the year at a low of \$1.435 and rose steadily to a high of \$2.142 per litre in June before beginning to decline, ending the year at \$1.512. The price of home heating oil averaged \$1.657 per litre in 2022, ranging from a high of \$2.143 per litre in November to a low of \$1.273 per litre in January. Labour Force


Employment on Prince Edward Island increased by 5.4 per cent, following a rise of 4.0 per cent in 2021. Employment averaged 84,200 people, a new all-time high for annual employment on Prince Edward Island. Employment in the goods-producing sector increased by 10.3 per cent in 2022, with employment levels increasing in agriculture (3.1 per cent), construction (24.1 per cent), and manufacturing (19.7 per cent). Employment in the service providing sector increased by 4.0 per cent. The labour force participation rate

fell from 65.9 per cent in 2021 to 65.5 per cent in 2022. The annual average unemployment rate declined from 9.7 per cent in 2021 to an all-time low of 7.6 per cent in 2022. ¹⁵

Diagram 7 shows that the *construction* and *manufacturing* industries led employment growth in 2022. Other notable gains occurred in *public administration*, and *health care and social assistance*. Notable employment losses occurred in *retail and wholesale trade*, *transportation and warehousing*, and *other primary industries*. ¹⁶



Statistics Canada's Survey of Employment, Payrolls and Hours (SEPH) shows that payroll employment on Prince Edward Island increased by 7.2 per cent in 2022, following an increase of 7.4 per cent in 2021. By this measure, employment increased in every sector. Notable employment growth was seen in *accommodation and food services* and *public administration*. Employment in public administration increased at all levels of government, led by a 17.3 per cent increase in provincial public administration, representing 667 people. ¹⁷



Labour productivity on PEI fell 2.2 per cent in 2022 from 2021, as compared to a drop of 1.0 per cent for Canada as whole. Over the past five years, PEI's labour productivity has increased by 3.7 per cent, the fourth highest among provinces.¹⁸

Income

Statistics Canada estimates that labour income for Prince Edward Island rose 10.0 per cent to reach \$4.6 billion in 2022. Diagram 8 shows labour income growth from 2013 to 2022. The major contributors to growth in 2022 were in professional and personal services (up by 12.9 per cent), manufacturing (up by 19.8 per cent), and health care and social assistance (up by 7.7 per cent). Population

As of July 1, 2022, the population of Prince Edward Island was estimated to be 170,688, an increase of 5,930 persons, or 3.6 per cent, over 2021. The population of Canada increased by 1.8 per cent over the same period.

International immigration slowed during the COVID-19 pandemic, with only 1,209 immigrants arriving on PEI from July 1, 2020 to June 30, 2021, a drop of 41.8 per cent as compared to the previous 12-month

period. As restrictions were eased during the second half of 2021, immigration began to rebound, resulting in a record 3,436 immigrants landing on PEI from July 1, 2021 to June 30, 2022. Other international migration²⁰ totaled 178, resulting in a total of 3,614 for net international migration.

Net interprovincial migration also reached an all-time high in 2021-22, with 2,260 more people moving to PEI from other parts of Canada than those leaving the Island. Ontario, Alberta, and Nova Scotia were the top provinces of origin for PEI's inter-provincial in-migrants. Revised 2020-21 population estimates now show PEI's net interprovincial migration was +1,220 over that period, revised from the preliminary estimate of +990. Estimates of interprovincial migration can be found in tables 5A and 5B.

Between July 1, 2021 and June 30, 2022, the total number of Island births was an estimated 1,499. The number of deaths was estimated to be 1,433, resulting in natural growth (births minus deaths) of +56.²¹ The recent influx of younger families has helped turn natural growth back into the positive for two consecutive years, following three years of deaths outnumbering births from 2017/18 to 2019/20.

The aging of the Island population is illustrated by the fact that the median age²² has risen from 24.8 years in 1971 (start of current data series) to 41.7 years in 2022. The median age for Canada over that same period has risen from 26.2 to 41.0. Recent immigration efforts have lowered the median age each year since 2016 from a high of 43.9, however this downward trend is not projected to continue. Furthermore, while only 11.0 per cent of the population was 65 years and older in 1971, this proportion has risen to 20.3 per cent in 2022, compared to 18.8 per cent for Canada, and continues to rise. The total dependency ratio²³ reached a low of 46.8 in 2007 and changed very little from 2007 to 2011. This ratio has increased to 53.7 in 2022.²⁴



Industrial Profiles

Manufacturing

Total shipments increased by 16.8 per cent in 2022 to a value of \$3.0 billion, a new all-time high. Shipments have increased every year since 2010, with the exception of the pandemic year of 2020. Durable goods increased 29.5 per cent, while shipments of non-durable goods rose by 11.0 per cent.²⁶ Diagram 9 shows total manufacturing shipments for Prince Edward Island from 2017 to 2022. Employment in the manufacturing sector increased 19.7 per cent over 2021 to reach 8,500 in 2022.²⁷



Exports

According to Industry Canada, the total value of PEI's exported goods grew from \$1.7 billion in 2021 to \$2.0 billion in 2022, an increase of 17.2 per cent. Exports of *frozen food products* made up 27.8 per cent of all international exports of goods in 2022. Frozen food product exports increased from \$402.8 million in 2021 to \$552.4 million in 2022, an increase of 37.1 per cent. Other exports included *seafood products* valued at \$378.0 million (down 17.0 per cent from 2021), \$145.1 million in *pharmaceutical and medicine* (up by 57.1 per cent) and \$141.2 million in *vegetable and melon farming* (up 24.0 per cent).

Exports from PEI to the European Union have more than doubled (up 129.4 per cent) since 2017, when the Canada – European Union Comprehensive Economic and Trade Agreement (CETA) went into effect. Over that period, exports of *pharmaceutical and medicine products* (up 146.4 per cent), *seafood products* (up 150.0 per cent), and *other basic organic chemical products* (up 239.4 per cent) have led PEI exports to the EU. As a result, Belgium, Spain and Greece have moved into the top 10 countries for PEI exports over this period, joining France and Germany on the list. ²⁸


Agriculture

Farm cash receipts for 2022 totaled \$740.7 million, an increase of 30.4 per cent over 2021. This compares to an increase of 14.1 per cent for Canada as a whole. Total crop receipts for PEI totaled \$477.4 million, an increase of 29.2 per cent. Potato receipts, which made up 69.2 per cent of total crop receipts, increased 41.0 per cent to total \$330.4 million. Total livestock receipts increased by 12.8 per cent to \$188.6 million, largely due to a 11.8 per cent rise in dairy receipts and a 23.1 per cent increase in receipts for cattle and calves. Direct payments to farmers saw an increase of 137.6 per cent, as potato farmers impacted by U.S. trade disruptions received \$20.2 million from the federal/provincial Surplus Potato Management Response program.²⁹

The total farm product price index increased by 9.2 per cent in 2022, as the price index rose in every major commodity group. For crops, grain prices saw the largest increase, at 14.1 per cent, while both fruit and vegetable prices increased by 10.3 per cent. Livestock prices also saw increases, with cattle prices leading the way, rising 18.1 per cent. For more data on Agriculture, see tables 66 to 78.

Retail Trade

Retail sales on Prince Edward Island in 2022 increased for the thirteenth consecutive year, with an 8.3 per cent increase. Sales were valued at \$3.4 billion. Notable increases were seen in *gasoline stations*, up 27.7 per cent or \$119.8 million, *supermarkets*, up 10.1 per cent or \$47.6 million, and *building material and garden equipment* stores, up 12.0 per cent or \$45.4 million.³⁰ Diagram 10 shows retail sales growth since 2013.





The number of new vehicles sold on Prince Edward Island saw a decrease of 1,195 units in 2022 to total 6,735, following a 12.8 per cent increase in 2021. The value of new vehicles sold decreased by 7.4 per cent, falling to \$286.4 million.³¹ Although demand for new vehicles was strong, sales were down due to supply constraints caused by the pandemic continuing throughout 2022. Employment in the wholesale/retail trade sector was 11,200, a decrease of 3.4 per cent compared to 2021.³² For information about the retail trade sector see Tables 50 and 51.

Fisheries

The *Department of Fisheries, Tourism, Sport and Culture* estimates that the value of total fish landings in 2022 fell by 10.9 per cent to \$426.2 million, following a 92.9 per cent increase in 2021. Molluscs and crustaceans remain by far the top species of the Island fishery comprising 97.6 per cent of the total value of all fish landings. Total lobster landings decreased by 5.9 per cent in 2022, which along with lower prices, contributed to the total value falling by 15.6 per cent to \$312.9 million. Lobster prices decreased from 2021 prices, to an average of \$7.05/lb in 2022. Diagram 11 shows the value of lobster landings on PEI from 2013 to 2022. The value of other crustaceans and molluscs increased by 7.3 per cent in 2022.



Landings of groundfish, pelagic and estuarial fish increased in 2022, following four years of decline, rising 30.2 per cent to 5.6 million pounds. Prices received by fishers increased or remained steady in 2022 for every major species, except lobster. Notable increases were seen in prices for rock crab (up by 200 per cent to \$1.95 /lb.) and oysters (up by 6.3 per cent to \$1.70/lb.). The price for mussels remained steady at \$0.80/lb. Tourism

2022 saw tourism rebound to pre-pandemic levels, with no travel restrictions in place for the entire season. Cruise ships were permitted to visit Charlottetown for the first time since 2019 and traffic flowed freely on the Confederation Bridge and the ferry services.

The total number of room nights sold at fixed roof accommodations rose by 70.0 per cent in 2022, following an increase of 68.0 per cent in 2021, to surpass pre-pandemic levels. Occupancy rates at Island accommodations improved to 49.0 per cent from 31.5 per cent in 2021, which also surpassed the 45.6 per cent seen in 2019. Site nights sold at campgrounds increased 33.3 per cent, with the occupancy rate up to 52.1 per cent from 39.2 per cent in 2021. In 2019, campgrounds had an occupancy rate of 47.9 per cent.³³

2022 saw a strong rebound in air traffic, however levels were still slightly below pre-pandemic levels. The total number of passengers travelling through Charlottetown Airport was up 207.3 per cent in 2022, rising from 111,160 in 2021 to 341,649 in 2022. This compares to 383,183 total passengers in 2019.³⁴

Total ferry passengers³⁵ increased by 35.3 per cent in 2022, following an increase of 59.1 per cent in 2021.³⁶ Total ferry traffic remained down 15.7 per cent as compared to 2019. Annual bridge traffic increased by 59.1 per cent in 2022, following a 4.4 per cent increase in 2021. Although traffic increased, this was still down 3.5 per cent as compared to 2019. Summer bridge traffic (July and August) increased 35.0 per cent over the same period in 2021, however remained 8.9 per cent below the 2019 level.³⁷ For more information on tourism indicators, see tables 85 to 89, and table 100 for transportation statistics.

Construction, Investment and Housing

Statistics Canada estimates that total non-residential capital expenditures on Prince Edward Island valued \$1.1 billion in 2022, an increase of 20.4 per cent over 2021.³⁸ Public sector investment increased from \$373.5 million in 2021 to \$529.7 million in 2022, an increase of 41.8 per cent, while private sector investment increased by 4.7 per cent, from \$506.8 million in 2021 to \$530.5 million in 2022.³⁹



Non-residential construction investment decreased by 16.5 per cent in 2022, due mainly to a 34.5 per cent decrease in industrial investment. Government and institutional investment also declined, falling 21.8 per cent, while commercial investment rose by 1.3 per cent.

Total residential investment declined 16.1 per cent in 2022, largely due to decreased investment in single family dwellings, which fell by 21.0 per cent. Investment in multi-unit dwellings increased by 18.6 per cent, while investment in other types of units fell 50.2 per cent in 2022. 40



The Canada Mortgage and Housing Corporation (CMHC) estimated that there were 1,318 new housing starts on Prince Edward Island in 2022. This is up by 58, or 4.6 per cent, from 2021. As seen in Diagram 12, the increase was due solely to starts in apartments and other multi-unit dwellings, while starts for all other types of housing declined. Starts for single-detached houses fell from 701 starts in 2021 to 591 in 2022.⁴¹

The annual vacancy rate for apartment structures of six units and over in Charlottetown fell 0.6 percentage points, from 1.5 per cent in 2021 to 0.9 per cent in 2022. At the same time, the rate in Summerside rose from 0.7 per cent in 2021 to 1.0 per cent in 2022.⁴² For more information on Housing, Investment and Construction see Tables 57 to 65.

Energy

Total electricity capability on Prince Edward Island remained steady in 2022 at 501 megawatts. Net peak load for the province in 2022 was 324 megawatts. PEI's total electric supply increased 4.5 per cent over 2021 to 1.6 million megawatt hours, with 1.3 million megawatt hours received from other provinces. The average monthly cost for 500 kWh of electricity increased 2.0 per cent in 2022, rising from \$99.17 in 2021 to \$101.17 in 2022.

The volume of gasoline sold dropped 1.0 per cent in 2022, as the average price rose 34.1 per cent. The sale of light fuel oil (furnace oil) dropped 4.2 per cent, as the average price increased 64.1 per cent.⁴⁴ The volume of light fuel oil sold has declined 17.6 per cent since 2019, as programs to transition households to electric heat have expanded.

Prince Edward Island's greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions were 1,627 kilotonnes CO2e (1.627 Mt CO2e) in 2021, the most recent year for which data is available. This is an increase of 44,500 tonnes over 2020, or 2.8 per cent. Transportation is the biggest source of greenhouse gas emissions in Prince Edward Island, accounting for 40.5 of total emissions in 2021, followed by agriculture (23.8 per cent) and buildings (18.1 per cent). On a per capita basis, PEI's GHG emissions were 9.9 tonnes in 2021, up slightly from 9.8 tonnes in 2020. This was the second lowest among provinces, with only Quebec lower at 9.0 tonnes, and compares to 17.5 tonnes for Canada as a whole.⁴⁵ For more information on Energy see Tables 90 to 99.

The Public Service Sector

Statistics Canada's *Survey of Employment, Earnings and Hours* (SEPH) indicates that employment in *public administration* (federal, provincial and municipal) increased by 9.6 per cent in 2022. Employment in the *health and social services* sector rose by 2.9 per cent, while employment in the *education* sector increased by 2.7 per cent.⁴⁶

Provincial Finance

The provincial *Public Accounts*, Consolidated Statement of Operations for fiscal year 2021/22 shows that the Province of Prince Edward Island received \$2.7 billion in total revenue, 12.2 per cent higher than in FY 2020/21. Provincial own-source revenues were valued at \$1.6 billion, an increase of 16.0 per cent from a year earlier. Total federal transfers to Prince Edward Island contributed 39.0 per cent to the province's total revenue in FY 2021/22 compared to 40.9 per cent in the last fiscal year. Equalization payments increased by 6.5 per cent to value \$483.9 million, while Canada Health and Social Transfer (CHST) payments increased 4.1 per cent to total \$251.5 million. Total expenditures rose by 8.4 per cent to reach \$2.6 billion. The Consolidated Statement of Operations shows a surplus for FY 2021/22 in the amount of \$83.8 million. As of March 31, 2022 the provincial net debt was \$2.3 billion, up 0.4 per cent from 2021. 47 More data on the government sector can be found in Tables 117 to 120.





Note: Statistics Canada has two monthly programs that measure employment levels and trends: the Labour Force Survey (LFS) and the Survey of Payroll, Employment and Hours (SEPH). The LFS is a household survey while SEPH is a payroll or establishment survey. The LFS provides a broader picture of employment, including employment in agriculture and the number of self employed. SEPH provides a highly reliable gauge of monthly change in non-farm payroll employment. Both the LFS and SEPH, along with information on the number of people receiving regular employment insurance, are useful for a complete picture of supply of the labour market.



Results of the Canadian Income Survey should not be compared to those produced by the Survey of Labour and Income Dynamics or other previous income surveys.

The low income cut-offs before tax (LICO-BT) are income thresholds below which a family will likely devote a larger share of its before-tax income on the necessities of food, shelter and clothing than the average family. The approach is essentially to estimate an income threshold at which families are expected to spend 20 percentage points more than the average family on food, shelter and clothing, based on the 1992 Family Expenditures Survey. LICOs are calculated in this manner for seven family sizes and five community sizes.

The Market Basket Measure (MBM) is based on the cost of a specific basket of goods and services representing a modest, basic standard of living. It includes the costs of food, clothing, shelter, transportation and other items for a reference family. These costs are compared to the disposable income of families to determine whether or not they fall below the poverty line.

Low income measures (LIMs), are relative measures of low income, set at 50% of adjusted median household income. These measures are categorized according to the number of persons present in the household, reflecting the economies of scale inherent in household size.

An economic family refers to a group of two or more persons who live in the same dwelling and are related to each other by blood, marriage, common-law, adoption or a foster relationship.




