The best response to unpredictable weather events is proper emergency planning. Here are a few tips and actions that you can take to make yourself more prepared for an emergency or other weather-related event:

- Make a household emergency plan and review the Province of PEI's Emergency Preparedness Guide.
- Bring in or tie down furniture, play equipment, barbeques or anything that can become projectiles in the event of high winds; and
- Ensure you have fuel for generators and vehicles, as well as propane for outdoor cooking devices such as barbeques.

#### **Safety Talk: Industrial Racking**

Industrial racking, also known as steels storage racks or pallet racks, are shelving units used to place, stack or store products in a safe and secure manner.

Racking systems can pose serious risk to workers if the system is poorly installed or maintained incorrectly.

The following tips will help reduce the risk of injury and property damage:

- Ensure the racking design and function suit the storage purpose.
- Ensure aisles are clear of debris and wide enough to accommodate powered mobile equipment.
- Ensure forklifts and powered mobile equipment are operated by competent drivers.

#### **Safety Talk: Confined Spaces**

Each year, many workers are injured and killed while working in confined spaces. Confined spaces are found across a wide range of industries, including construction. Confined spaces can present workers with many hazards from poor air quality to risks of drowning. Employers and workers must be able to properly identify confined spaces, identify the hazards present, and properly mitigate the risks. The majority of deaths in confined spaces result from oxygen deficiency and lack of air quality testing. More than half of those who die in confined spaces are people trying to rescue fellow workers.

A confined space is defined as an enclosed or partially enclosed space that

- a. Is not designed or intended for human occupancy;
- b. Has restricted access or exit; and
- Is or may become hazardous to a person entering it because of its design, construction, location, atmosphere or the materials or substances in it or other conditions.

### **Heat Stress Prevention Guide**

High temperatures can leave workers at risk of developing heat-related illnesses, including heat exhaustion and heat stroke. Heat stroke can be life-threatening and is considered a medical emergency. Any heat illness is a negative outcome for a worker's health and can have a significant impact on a worker's performance. Employers must take every reasonable precaution to protect the health and safety of workers which includes planning to reduce the risk of heat stress.

Outdoor workplaces with high physical demands have traditionally been of highest concern for heat stress like construction sites, farms, and road building. Indoor workplaces that require heat sources like kitchens, bakeries, greenhouses and foundries are also of highest concern. In addition, climate change has resulted in trends of increased hot weather events that impact all Islanders. Heat waves and periods of extended high temperatures heighten the concerns of heat stress in outdoor and indoor work environments. Extreme weather also extends heat stress concerns to work in buildings that lack adequate cooling systems.

#### **Risk of Drowning**

Spring fishing is currently in full swing on PEI and workers face a high risk of drowning due to various factors. For the safety of workers, it is important to wear personal protective equipment (PPE) such as life jackets, personal flotation devices (PFDs) and fall protection gear.

#### **Employer Duties**

Employers must:

- Make sure any PPE used does not become a hazard in the workplace
- Make sure that all PPE is maintained in good condition.

Specific to lifejackets and personal flotation devices, the employer is responsible for:

 Making sure that workers exposed to a risk of drowning are provided with, and wear at all times, a lifejacket or personal flotation devices that is

- suitable to the conditions and the right size and appropriate buoyancy for the weight of the worker.
- Making sure the lifejackets and devices are inspected and maintained as required by the manufacturer's instructions and recommendations.
- Keeping records of all inspections and maintenance for the life of the lifejacket or device.

## Safety Hazards Parking Lots – Fall Prevention

Parking lots are a special adjunct to many workplaces. Even though you may not be conducting your job there, there is still a possibility that you can be injured. Besides the risk of violence, the major risk includes falls resulting from slips and trips.

A smooth, even, flat surface is ideal for walking because it reduces the likelihood of twisted ankles or loss of balance which can lead to falls and other painful mishaps. However, heavy use by both pedestrians and vehicle traffic both cause parking surfaces to deteriorate. Leaks and spills of engine oil or antifreeze, which commonly occur wherever cars are parked, can further add to risks of slips and falls. In outdoor parking lots, severe weather conditions additionally aggravate even slight damage to the parking surface.

How can you prevent falls?

- Good lighting
- Good housekeeping
- Good quality walking surface in the parking area
- Clear marking of steps, ramps, tire stops, speed bumps, or other elevation changes
- Garbage cans available for trash
- Sand/salt, shovels, or brooms available to clear the
- Removal of debris from drains and grates to reduce flooding
- Appropriate walking pace: walk, don't run
- Paying attention to where you are going
- Selection of proper footwear

### Safety Talk: Asbestos Management

Asbestos is a strong, fire-resistant mineral fibre. Before 1990, more than 3,000 products containing asbestos were used in residential and commercial building construction. Today, when renovating or demolishing older homes or buildings, there is a high probability of encountering asbestoscontaining materials.

It's very important to take the time to stop, test and plan on sites that may contain asbestos. When products containing asbestos are disturbed, fine fibres can be released into the air, and without appropriate precautions, can be inhaled into the lungs. Once the fibres are lodged in the lungs, they can cause inflammation, scar tissue, and can escalate to breathing troubles. In some cases, it can even lead to serious health conditions.

#### **Working Alone**

A person is "alone" at work when they are on their own; when they cannot be seen or heard by another person. It is important to consider all situations carefully. Working alone includes all workers who may go for a period of time where they do not have direct contact with a co-worker.

While it is not always hazardous to work alone, it can be when other circumstances are present. Whether a situation is a high or low risk will depend on the location, type of work, interaction with the public, or the consequences of an emergency, incident, injury, etc. This wide variety of circumstances makes it important to assess each situation individually.

Prince Edward Island has regulations that address working alone under the *Occupational Health and Safety Act General Regulations*, Section 53.
